

Introduction

Editorial

I have been very lucky to take over the role of Recorder from Norman Hallas, who, mainly single-handedly, produced the last five Clwyd Bird Reports. I have found out what a huge amount of work he had done. However, the production schedule of the Clwyd Bird Reports had slipped so that the reports were appearing late in the day. The CBRG agreed with my proposal that we try to catch up and so we have produced a three-year report, though we expect to return to annual reports after this one.

Because of the implications of the boundary issues, described below, I have taken this opportunity to change the name of the report and to alter the format within the species accounts so that our report corresponds more closely with the Welsh Bird Report that we support by providing our collated records.

The CBRG has had to consider how best to present our information about birds in order to meet the very different demands of the public on whom we depend to purchase the report (thereby providing a source of income to pay for the next report). We know that the demands of twitchers are very different to those of, say, the RSPB in any review of the conservation status of what were common species. We hope that we have bridged the interests of all people who have an interest in the birds of north-east Wales. We also hope that we have maintained an adequate record of the fortunes of bird species which live in our area in the hope that they will continue to live, possibly even thrive, for future generations.

In preparing this three-year report, the members of the CBRG decided to concentrate efforts on the less common species. Therefore, for some species, eg Mute Swan, which is common and not of any current conservation concern, there appears a table to show the number of records received for each county, each year and the months in which the records were made. In future reports we anticipate reporting on all species in the normal way. For some species there is a very large increase in the number of records, in Flintshire, in 2005. This is caused by one person entering many records of birds 'present' in his garden in Birdtrack, for a period, almost on a daily basis.

I must make a short comment about species names. In recent years there was considered, by some in the international birding community, to be a need to have species names in English that were species-specific (though there were perfectly adequate scientific names to do the job, that also work well when birding with people who do not speak English). These names have now appeared in the latest version of the BOU checklist of British birds published in Ibis in 2006, so are the 'official' English names. Some names of common species have changed and are, for example, 'Eurasian Reed Warbler' or 'European Goldfinch'. These are the names that are used for importing records to the database and they are used in the systematic list for each species account heading. In other parts of the report, the authors have used the old common names such as 'Reed Warbler' or 'Goldfinch'. To the best of our reading there should be no confusions between species as a result of this.

We trust that the balance of the report will suit most observers. However, we also understand that the era of the 'bird report' as a book may be passing. We may need to explore the viability of publishing a web-based report. From the point of view of writing the report there is no change in the task; the big change is about the financial risk of printing a number of reports that maybe do not all sell, against investing in web-creation software and publishing the report at low cost

to the CBRG but at great inconvenience to anyone who prefers to read 'something', a book, in their armchair, or wherever. I would welcome comments from any reader as to what they would prefer. Ultimately, though, the decision will depend on how many bird reports are bought. Please encourage as many people as you can to buy this report and learn about the birds of north-east Wales.

Boundary issues

The Clwyd Bird Recording Group (CBRG) was formed in 1989 but Clwyd ceased to be in 1996 when local government reorganisation brought in the current unitary authorities. Within Wales, the Welsh Ornithological Society encourages the use of the Vice County boundaries that had been in use for over one hundred years prior to 1974, when Clwyd was formed.

However, since I took over as the County Recorder I have become aware of several issues about boundaries that were not known, or not clear, at the time when the last report (for 2003) was published. I am grateful for discussion with, and information from, David Ballance, that has helped with clarifying these issues. In this report there are three maps to clarify the boundary issues: firstly, the Vice Counties shown with rivers and major inland waters included to give some notion of place (Figure 1); secondly, a similar map of Clwyd (Figure 2); and lastly a map showing the current Unitary Authority boundaries (Figure 3).

When I took over the role I used an Ordnance Survey map (Sheet 107, printed 1962) for my knowledge of the northern boundary between VC49, Caernarfon, and VC50, Denbighshire. This showed a boundary that came north up the western bank of the Afon Conwy to a point near Benarth Hall, then a distinct turn to just north of east across the estuary and following the line of a stream entering the estuary at about SH803772. The boundary then gently curved north to the coast in the middle of Penrhyn Bay. After taking over the role, I found that research on behalf of the National Biodiversity Network shows that the boundary goes north up the western bank of the Afon Conwy, past Benarth Hall to the level of the railway bridge, then east on what is now the line of the A55 dual carriageway. It then follows the line of the previously understood boundary until just south of Penrhyn Bay when it veers to the east passing north of Llandrillo-yn-Rhos, but south of Rhos-on-Sea, reaching the sea to the north west of the Colwyn Bay, approximately opposite the middle of the current breakwater. This is also shown on the map at the back of HE Forrest, 1907, *The Fauna of North Wales*, London: Witherby. See Figure 1 for a map of the Vice County boundaries as I understand them.

This explanation is here because of two consequent changes to the area that is our duty to report. Firstly, the positive difference means that the whole of RSPB Conwy can be considered as being in VC50, Denbighshire, but the downside is that we have 'lost' Rhos-on-Sea and Rhos Point to VC49, Caernarfon.

In recent months, I have reached agreement with John Barnes, the Recorder for Caernarfon, that we will both record birds from RSPB Conwy – from his point of view, it is a site that he had understood to be in VC49, Caernarfon since its creation and before. It should be clear that any birds reported are from this one site and double recording for any national recording schemes (eg Rare Birds Breeding Panel) should not be a problem. John has also agreed that the salient of Caernarfon that is east of the Afon Conwy in the area around Maenan, should be considered to be in VC50, Denbighshire, so we use the river as our joint boundary.

Jim Dustow, the Recorder for Meirionydd, likes to include all of the Migneint in Meirionydd,

although there is the long extension of Denbighshire into that area of mountains. We have agreed to double record the area, though in reality the only source of data, currently, is from RSPB surveys. Having thought about the issue of the north-eastern corner of Meirionydd (that takes in Bod Petrual in Clocaenog Forest), I have decided that it would be best for me to accept records from that area (as a part of Clwyd) but to pass on those records to the Recorder for Meirionydd and we may, possibly, mention species recorded there if there is some special reason. Otherwise, we will report on records from within our VC area. See Figure 2 for a map of the old county of Clwyd.

That leaves one last area of contention. I have discussed the matter with Brayton Holt, the Recorder for Montgomeryshire. He needs to keep an account of records that occur within the Unitary Authority of Powys, and its modern boundary comes to the north of the Tanat Valley, whereas the southern boundary of VC50 extends to the south of the Tanat Valley. I shall collect records for the VC Denbighshire and we shall report on those records, but I shall ensure that I pass on the records that are within the modern Powys boundary to the Montgomeryshire Recorder.

There is one last problem that I cannot do anything about – the western edge of the recording and reporting area for this report is inconveniently in the middle of the new county of Conwy. See Figure 3 for the Unitary Authority boundaries. This is awkward for many reasons, mainly to do with reporting on local biodiversity issues and organising surveys or projects.

For members of the public, or any birdwatchers who are not especially interested or knowledgeable about these boundary issues, the key thing is for records for north-east Wales to be sent to me. I shall pass on any that are of interest to a Recorder in a neighbouring area.

Computerisation of records

When I agreed to take on the role of recorder in 2005, I knew that I would not be able, or willing, to deal with paper records. In view of the volume that I have received I am amazed that my predecessor, Norman Hallas, was able to put together a bird report at all. I decided that we must move to computerisation of records so that we would be able to search for, find and report on the records that we receive.

Several years before my new involvement with the CBRG, it had acquired a laptop and the program Recorder 2000, which was the program that was being promoted nationally for all recorders of any taxa to use for biological recording. As the CBRG had the software, I decided to try it. I started with an upgrade, to Recorder 2002, and had a difficult period getting used to it but was informed by colleagues at rECOrd in Chester that it was possible to use a spreadsheet to gather records and import them to the Recorder database. This meant that I would be able to send out a spreadsheet to recorders who have computers and are willing to submit records electronically. Currently I am using a further upgrade, Recorder 6 and am still waiting for some issues to be resolved to assist my accurate recording of all species and important subspecies, particularly White and Pied Wagtails.

The spreadsheet for submission of records has been created in Excel but is available in other formats if needed (eg for those who do not have Excel, I have the spreadsheet available in the Open Office format – Open Office is a suite of programs that are freely available from the internet). I have been very pleased that the majority of recorders have been able and willing to submit their records electronically. There are just four regular sources of records that now

arrive on paper. I typed the majority of the 2004 records into copies of the spreadsheet and imported the data. Since then I have had help from a couple of people, but my main assistant with this task is Jim Hulse, from Rhydymwyn. He has been my 'Assistant Recorder' and has typed up many thousands of records, saving me many hours of work, for which I am extremely grateful.

The CBRG database holds over 51,000 records and most of the 2007 records are still to be imported. Having the records on a database has meant that I have been able to respond to requests for bird data in relation to development enquiries which provides some welcome financial income that supports the production of bird reports. Having a growing database means that we will have to deal with the issue of establishing a data exchange agreement with Cofnod, the Local Record Centre for North Wales, though there are many steps to that process and I have not had sufficient time to start it as yet. One of the first steps will be to seek the agreement of all observers who submit records.

Submission of records

A standard record form is available from me or the CBRG Secretary and it would be most helpful if these forms were used and submitted to me, as Recorder, by email. All the records are imported to a database so it does not matter about the order of the records – it is probably easiest to use the forms chronologically, just entering the latest observations that you have recorded. The crucial aspects of each record are:

- Species name (as in the new BOU checklist);
- Date of the observation;
- Location name (preferably from the gazetteer, but if not then a name for the 1 km square that looks sensible);
- The 1 km square grid reference (this is crucial);
- The age or sex of the bird;
- The number of birds seen (please do not enter pairs as one record please enter the number of males then on the next line, the number of females);
- The Vice County number, if known (eg 50 or 51); and
- In the comments column please enter any other aspects of the observation that are pertinent.

All of these details are stored. As the records are handled electronically, it does not matter how frequently you record the observations and please keep records of common species as much as rarities, but of particular concern now are those species that are either Amber or Red listed, or are species on the Welsh Biodiversity Action Plan (WBAP) list. Included in this report are maps showing the distribution of the few records we have received for some species of high conservation concern.

Records can be made available to the CBRG in a variety of ways, some of which are better than others. They would all be equally good, if they all had the same requirements, but that is expecting a lot. Records of bird sightings may be made available by:

- using a spreadsheet available from me (ianspence.cr@btinternet.com) with a gazetteer for place names, and a list of the BOU 2006 checklist species names;
- by using Birdtrack (www.birdtrack.net);
- by using the Cofnod record submission facility (www.cofnod.org.uk);
- by using the Birdguides record submission facility (www.birdguides.com but please give your name and address – see the rarity section, below); and
- by using the website run by Richard Smith (www.deeestuary.co.uk) emailing your records to him.

Please submit your records regularly, preferably no less frequently than every quarter. For your records to be considered for a bird report, please submit the records before the end of March of the following year. After that date they may be too late to include.

I look forward to receiving records from existing and new observers.

Rarity records

If you see a bird that is considered to be a rarity, please refer to the copy of the BOU 2006 checklist of species that I prepared that show if each species is a national, Welsh or local rarity then contact me at the email address above. I can also email or send you a form on which to record the usual information that is required – the details are shown in the bird report for 2003. If you take any digital photos, please label them with date, species, place and your name.

Please submit records of rarities to me as soon as is possible after the observation.

I have tried to ensure that records of rare birds have been dealt with properly, and verified by the appropriate panel. However, many of the records were processed well over a year after the observations were made and not all observers submitted descriptions as requested in previous reports. Many records of rarities came from the Birdguides website, but were anonymous, so I was unable to follow them up with enquiries about descriptions or photographs. As a result they have not been used as they could not go through any verification process. If you see a rarity and use the Birdguides, or other, website, please give contact details as well as details of the observation.

Some national rarities have been submitted to the BBRC (secretary@bbrc.org.uk), have been accepted and have appeared in British Birds. Those records have been included in this report. Some records of Welsh rarities have been submitted to the Welsh Rarities Panel (jrgreen@onetel.com), have been accepted and appeared in copies of Rare and Scarce Birds in Wales they have been included in this report. Currently, there is yet another category - of local rarities. These have been submitted to our small, local panel for their consideration and after discussion those deemed to be acceptable have been included.

Acknowledgements

Producing this report seemed to be a daunting task, when we first contemplated undertaking it. I am very grateful to those who contributed by writing a suite of species accounts, with the guidelines about how to produce the accounts changing as we gained experience. I also thank those people for their patience. The contributors who helped me with the writing were: Anne Brenchley, Peter Coffey, Andrew Dale, Neil Hughes, Mel ab Owain, Geoff Robinson, Julie Rogers, Paul Triggs and Andrew Wallbank. I am also grateful to Peter and Ann Coffey for proof reading the report (any remaining errors are my responsibility).

I thank Alan Davies and Susan Morris – the panel who help me make decisions about local rarities – for their assistance.

This has been my first experiment preparing a report in QuarkXPress and I am very grateful to Amanda Bunnell for her patience in teaching me some basic processes. She has also assisted with aspects of design (eg preparing the striking front cover) and seeking quotations from printers.

The maps have been produced using DMAP by Dr Alan J Morton, and I am very grateful to him when he has assisted with any query I have made to him.

Jim Hulse has typed up other people's records and is now submitting his own - I am very grateful to him for his assistance.

Len Walls has been very helpful in providing weather data from his Moel y Crio weather station at Halkyn, Flintshire.

The leap forward in the quality of the production of this report has involved a considerable financial investment. Birding Highlights 2004 - 2006

This paper briefly summarises the main birding highlights and events for the three years covered by this report. The paper is based on all records received by the County Recorder and subsequently verified by the local, Welsh and British Birds Rarities Committee. Some readers may note discrepancies between this report and records highlighted in the Welsh Bird Report (especially 2004) and reports in other monthly magazines. In the past some records have bypassed the County Recorder and we hope that this situation will be rectified in the future. Also other records noted in magazines and bulletins, which subsequently cannot be verified because descriptions are either not submitted or do not stand close scrutiny, are not included in this report. Omissions also occasionally occur and for this we offer our apologies – we would prefer all observers to send their records to the Recorder.

2004

The year began with most birdwatchers being drawn to the coast to see the regular influx of divers (including one Great Northern Diver), waders, seaducks, geese and Bewick Swan. An American Wigeon at Border Pool, Inner Marsh Farm in late January was the first rarity of the year. One or two Great Grey Shrikes put in a regular appearance at the usual sites in Clocaenog Forest. As spring approached up to 40 Twite were seen along the coast near Flint. Spring migration produced a White Stork at Inner Marsh Farm in April, a Temminck's Stint at RSPB Conwy in May and two Spoonbills, which turned up at Rhyl, were a feature of June. The national Nightjar survey identified at least six sites where breeding probably took place. Most sightings were from Clocaenog Forest area. Late August and September saw a good passage of skuas at Point of Ayr, including Pomarine, Long-tailed, Great and Arctic Skua. September also brought a Little Auk to Towyn and three Sabine's Gulls at Point of Ayr. October saw a Green-winged Teal to Inner Marsh Farm and a Firecrest was ringed at Bronbannog. Another Firecrest turned up at Conwy RSPB reserve in November and a Little Auk was seen at Point of Ayr. The Waxwing influx started in November but numbers built up in December until they reached record proportions with 325 seen around the Rhuthun Craft Centre on Christmas Eve. One of the flock of 120 Waxwing found at Ewloe in late December had been colour ringed at Inverurie, Aberdeen in late October. A Richard's Pipit was the last notable bird of the year when one was seen in the Kinmel Bay area in December.

2005

Gulls galore! Gresford Flash was the place to be in January when Ring-billed, Glaucous, Iceland and Yellow-legged Gull all turned up. The Iceland Gull stayed in the Wrexham area until mid March. A flock of over 100 Twite was counted in the Oakenholt/Flint area in January and a male Smew showed up at Inner Marsh Farm and was probably the same bird seen at Shotwick Boating Lake a few days later. The Richard's Pipit seen in 2004 was still in the Kinmel Bay area at the beginning of the year and stayed on until well into April. The gull spree continued as Mediterranean Gull and Little Gull were seen at Pensarn in February and a Little Auk was seen off Point of Ayr. The first Osprey of the year was seen over Buckley in late March and a few Waxwings hung on in the Wrexham area until early April, when a late Brambling was also seen. Hobby arrived at Fenn's Moss in late April and the only Longeared Owl of the year was seen being chased by a Buzzard at Gronant. In May, Garganey were recorded at Inner Marsh Farm and RSPB reserve at Conwy. The only Corn Bunting in all three years of the report was seen sitting on the boundary fence at Inner Marsh Farm but sadly this may no longer be a breeding species in North-East Wales. A notable rarity was the Short-toed Lark at Towyn in May. Several Quail were heard calling in the Mynydd Hiraethog area in June and July. Summer birding activity was fairly quiet but as autumn migration started, Leach's Petrel and Velvet Scoter were seen from Towyn in September. Scoter numbers

built up as autumn progressed and 14,000 **Common Scoter** were counted off the coast in October along with over 50 **Red-throated Diver**. **Black-tailed Godwit** numbers reached their annual peak of 5700 on the Dee Estuary. A **Long-tailed Skua** and 16+ **Leach's Petrel** were seen off Point of Ayr in October and another nice rarity, a **Long-billed Dowitcher** was seen at Inner Marsh Farm. An unusually late **Swallow** record was on the 26 November. In December, another **Ring-billed Gull** was seen at Gresford Flash along with an usually large flock of 500 **Lapwing**. Finally on Boxing Day a **Lapland Bunting** was seen at Llanasa.

2006


Birdwatchers out on the first day of the year were greeted with the spectacular sight of 80+ Goldeneye on Rhyl Marine Lake. A Water Pipit was present at RSPB Conwy on most days of the month and a Yellow-legged Gull was seen at Gresford Flash and RSPB Conwy. Shotwick fields held 80 **Bewick's Swan** along with 130 **Golden Plover** in February. Nineteen Little Ringed Plover recorded at RSPB Conwy on 10 February suggested that these birds would have a good breeding season but whilst birds were recorded throughout the summer months, breeding was not confirmed. In March, 33 Goldeneye were on Llyn Brenig; and Black Grouse showed well at the lek in Llandegla Forest, which must be one of the area's best bird spectaculars. April brought one record of Dartford Warbler and a Slavonian Grebe off Llanddulas. Green Woodpeckers were widely reported in the Llangollen area and Lesser Spotted Woodpecker records increased from previous years. A Wood Sandpiper was present at Inner Marsh Farm in May and a rare spring record of Great Skua and a late Glaucous Gull were noted. Although spring/summer records of Red Kite increased in 2006 successful breeding has yet to be confirmed but Hobby did breed in 2006. In June, a Honey Buzzard was seen at Bettisfield Moss and a possible Montagu's Harrier noted at Fenn's Moss. If this is confirmed it will the first record of this species for North-East Wales. At Gronant, 110 pairs of Little Tern bred and record numbers of Common Tern (722 pairs) bred at Shotton with over 1000 young ringed in July. A Turtle Dove, now a very scarce summer visitor, was seen and heard in the Ruabon area and an unconfirmed but well-watched Stilt Sandpiper was seen at RSPB Conwy. The autumn sea passage got underway in August with 150 Manx Shearwater seen off Point of Ayr and a flock of 21 Black Tern were seen offshore moving west at Towyn Beach in September. A juvenile Black Guillemot seen at Towyn was the only record for the reporting years. In October and November individual Velvet Scoter and Great Northern Diver were recorded. An increase in Little Egret records occurred at RSPB Conwy with 14 birds seen in October. An Avocet on the Dee Estuary was a notable sighting. Movements of large numbers of winter migrants were noted at the beginning of November including 1000 Fieldfare moving south over Penycae. As the year closed, an unusual sighting of a Leach's Petrel was noted on the Conwy estuary and on the RSPB reserve lagoon.




This was a relatively warm and wet year but with no major extreme weather events to record. 27 Jul was the warmest day with a maximum temperature of 30.1°C The lowest temperature occurred on 29 Jan and 28 Feb when the temperature went down to -3.6°C. Sunshine for the year was average but Feb was notable with 114.7 hrs which was an impressive 163% of average and Dec had over 170% of usual sunshine. May had the most sunshine hours and the sunniest day was on 23 May with 14.8 hrs. Jan was the wettest month with 134.7mm =174% of average making this the second

wettest Jan since 1948. Aug was also a wet month with rain recorded on 21 days. The total was 132.7 mm making this the wettest Aug since 1986. The driest month was Mar with a rainfall of 28.3mm. The wettest day was 23.0mm on 19 Nov. Snowfall was limited to 20 days. Cloud amount was above average particularly Jul which was a very cloudy month as was Nov when there were 15 days with no sunshine whatever. Wind speeds averaged 9.5 mph, which were slightly below average continuing the decline in recent years and so not surprisingly there were fewer gales this year. As the chart shows, most winds this year were from the NW to SW quarter.

2005

This was another warm but slightly drier year than 2004. 12 Jul was the warmest day with a maximum temperature of 27.2°C. The lowest temperature occurred on 29 Dec when the temperature went down to -5.2°C. The year started much drier than normal and most of the rain came surprisingly in Apr and Oct but the year closed with above average rainfall in Dec. The wettest month was Oct with 125.2mm





=135% of average; the wettest day was 11 Oct with 30.5mm. The driest month was Jan with rainfall of 40.3mm. Snowfall was limited to 24 days compared with 51 days in 1985. The sunniest month was May with a total of 230.7 hrs (= 121% of average). The sunniest day was 8 Jun with 15.2 hrs of sunshine. Wind speeds averaged 9.0 mph and were slightly below average continuing the decline in recent years. Fourteen gales were recorded, somewhat less than expected, 8 of which were in Jan. The chart shows that the wind was much more varied this year, mainly from N through W to SE.


2006

This was a hot and dry year. The average mean temperature for Halkyn Mountain was the warmest on record (1981-2006) with a value of 9.7°C. This is 1.2°C above average. The warmest day was on 19 Jul with a maximum of 31.1°C. The coldest day was 3 Mar with a minimum of -6.8°C. Mar was unusually the coldest month of the year. All four seasons were above average temperature. Winter was very dry with only 173.4mm of rain (= 75% of average). In fact there was a drought from 20 Jan to 6 Feb. In contrast spring was very wet indeed with 303 mm (= 160% of average). The summer months were dry with a total rainfall of 155.6 mm (= 77%) and a partial drought occurred from 28 Jun to 28 Jul. Autumn was just below average rainfall with a total of 263 mm (= 96%). Mar, Aug, Oct and Dec were all wet months, all the rest were dry, The total rainfall for the year was 947 mm = 106% of average at Moel y Crio and the total rainfall at Berth Ddu was 937.5 mm. The wettest month of the year was Mar with a total of 132.7 mm of rain; it was also the only month with appreciable snow




cover with 10 days with snow lying; the maximum depth recorded was 10 cms on the 4 Mar. The wettest day was on 25 Oct with a fall of 31.9mm; the driest month of the year was Jul with only 11.2mm in the whole month. The sunniest month was Jul with 240.8 hrs (154% of average) and the maximum sun was on 3 Jun with 16.3 hrs. The sunniest months relating to average value were Jan, Apr, May, Jun, Jul, Sep and Nov which were all above average; the rest were dull. Wind speeds increased noticeably this year reversing the tendency of recent years to decline, with a big increase in the westerlies

(41% of readings). The wind in Nov and Dec was particularly strong and persistent from the W, with winds of gale force lasting much longer than for many years. The maximum gust recorded at Moel y Crio in December was 73 mph during the squall on 31 Dec. During that




storm the rain was falling at a rate of 51 mm per hour for 10 minutes. The maximum gust for the year was 78 mph on 19 November. The chart shows that the majority of winds during the year came from the W.



A comment on weather trends....

I have to admit that I used to be fairly sceptical about the so called Global Warming. However, when I examine the above statistics, namely the unpredictable nature of the rainfall and the big increase in the temperature over the UK and Europe as a whole, I have to conclude that the climate of the world is changing at an alarming pace, far faster than any previous oscillation. For example the average maximum daily temperature in July at Moel y Crio was 5°C above average, in the same way the mean temperature for the whole year was 9.7°C, an increase of +1.2°C above average (see graph below with trend added). Please note that these temperatures were measured on NPL certified thermometers and are not extracted from cyber space by a mathematical climate model, as to what might occur. Although I recognise that these averages can go down as well as up, if this figure is superimposed on to the official graph of the expected global warming projections given on page 5 of "The Potential Effects of Climate Change in the UK" published by HMSO in 1991 it would equal the expected increase that is projected for the year 2010 already, and that is even with the worst case scenario of a 3 band graph. It seems to me that these facts must make it all the more imperative that if we have the wellbeing of children and grandchildren in mind we should all make every conceivable effort to reduce our carbon footprint on the world, and reduce our consumption of all products manufactured from fossil fuels in all its forms, before it is too late.

We have abbreviated the names of months to just three letters (eq Jan, Feb, etc).

We have included maps to show the distribution of the records received for some species where we considered that maps would assist the summarising of those records. If you are aware of areas of the country where those species are present, but there are no symbols to show their presence, please send in records to the Recorder.

In preparing this report it has become clear to the authors that we receive very few records of proven breeding by species that are not subject to specialist study, such as the nest records that are reported in tables, mainly for raptors and some passerines. We would welcome knowing where any of these species are found to breed using the codes for evidence that are generally used for bird atlas purposes (by the time this report is published we expect that many of you will be acquainting yourselves with these codes for the BTO atlas).

At the end of this section Anne Brenchley has written about the first and last dates for migrants. I repeat, here, her plea for observers to keep recording the dates that migrants are seen later in the season. It is easy to record the new presence of a species — it is impossible to record the first absence of a species. We need to know the dates that, say, Swallows were still here so that we can find out the date of their last presence in the area.

Mute Swan (Cygnus olor) Breeding resident.

Tundra Swan (Cygnus columbianus)

ALARCH BEWICK

Annual, but uncommon winter visitor. Amber List. WBAP

The Dee Estuary is a site of national importance for this species, with Shotwick fields and boating lake being a particularly favoured location. There were no records from Denbs. during the report period.

2004

Flints. Up to 60 recorded on the Dee Estuary throughout Jan with favoured areas being Shotwick fields and boating lake. A late record of 25 at OMR on 8/03 was the latest of that spring (pCW). The first returning birds recorded on 12/11 when 25 were at White Sands, Oakenholt (pCW). Recorded throughout Nov and Dec with peak counts of 85 at Flint and

Broken Bank on 29/12 (DOJ, ANB).

2005

Flints. Recorded from 7/01 to 19/02, with a peak count of 60 at Flint on 7/01 (ANB). Later in the year, there was only a solitary record of 24 at IMF on 19/11 (CW).

2006

Flints. Recorded almost exclusively from the Shotwick fields area from 2/02 to 3/03, grazing on winter cereals, often with other swans. A maximum of 80 noted on 10/02 (AN). Wintering birds present 5/11 to 30/12, numbers building to 20 on the latter date (KS).

Whooper Swan (Cygnus cygnus)

ALARCH Y GOGLEDD

Annual, but irregular winter visitor in small numbers.

2004

Denbs. Recorded in small numbers from inland sites in the Dee, Clwyd and Conwy valleys. An adult and two juveniles on River Dee floods at Trevalyn Meadows 7-8/02 (NHu), while one at Holt 28/03 to 4/04 (NF). The only autumn/winter record was of 4 noted flying N over CON (ALD).

Flints. Small numbers with other swans at Shotwick fields, including a maximum count of 30+ on 2/01, but more usually 2. Also recorded from POA and Oakenholt there 7 were recorded on 8/03 (CW), the last record for spring. Returning birds noted from 13/10, 8 at POA (ANB, RS) to 29/12, 10 at Flint (ANB).

2005

Denbs. No records.

Flints. Very few recorded, 10-11 in the Flint/Shotwick area 7-9/01 (ANB, KS); and 4 flying N over Sychdyn on 11/02 (KG) being the only spring records. The only winter record was of 8 at Shotwick on 3/10 (CW).

2006

Denbs. The only spring birds reported were two flying W over Rhuddlan on 2/02 (SM). The first record of the winter was 4 at CON on 23/10 (ALD). There were intermittent reports from the Conwy Valley throughout the remainder of the year with 4 over Carneddau/Benarth on 7/12, and 3 at CON on 23/12 (ALD).

Flints. The majority of reports (eight) from Shotwick fields area where birds were recorded grazing winter cereal fields. A maximum of 16 was noted during 7-10/02, and the last record before migration was of 6 on 3/03 (KS). First recorded winter birds on the Dee were 8 at IMF on 29/10 (CW, ST); and 3 adults and a juvenile were at Shotwick fields the following day (WAO, ANB). A single bird remained on the estuary being noted at Shotwick and POA until 16/12 when 12 were at Shotwick (ANB), and 30/12 with 20 at the same site (KS).

Pink-footed Goose (Anser brachyrhynchus)

GWYDD DROED-BINC

Passage migrant, and winter visitor in small numbers.

The majority of records are from various sites around the Dee Estuary' POA and Shotwick fields being particularly favoured.

2004

Denbs. 200 seen flying SW over Towyn on 26/02 (SM) was the only report of substantial numbers from the county; though inland 2-4 were reported from the Holt/Trevalyn Marshes area 21-28/02 (DOJ, NF). An unusual summer record of a single bird at Gresford Flash, Wrexham on 15/05 (KS) was probably either a bird of feral origin, or a sick or injured individual unable to migrate.

Flints. Recorded 6/02-8/03 (eleven records) mostly from POA, Warren Farm with a maximum of 189 on 2/03 (SD). Winter records were few, starting with 3 birds reported from FLQ on 4/11 (KS); the only record of significant numbers was of 240 at Gronant on 26/11(CR), and a single bird at CQNR and Oakenholt on 30/12 (ELJ, CW).

2005

Denbs. The only record was of 81 flying over Holt on 23/01(NF).

Flints. at BHP Warren Farm, POA a flock of c45 was present from 23/01-9/03 (SD, RS, JB, ABG), maximum of 47 on 16/02. Birds were also at Shotwick fields, with 15 on 3/02, a flock of 172 on 21/02, and 150 remaining until at IE 11/03 (CW). Smaller numbers (maximum 8) were also recorded at FLQ on a number of dates throughout the winter up to 11/04 (KS). The first autumn record was of 19 at Shotwick fields on 16/09 (CW), and small numbers were noted both here and at POA on a few occasions up to the year-end. However the only record of substantial numbers was of 110 flying N over Sychdyn on Christmas Day (AB).

2006

Denbs. The only records were of a single bird at CON from 6/03-4/05 (ALD), and 30+ seen flying S over Llanddulas beach on 2/12 (SM).

Flints. Recorded principally from Shotwick fields and boating lake between 10/02 and 26/03 with a peak count of 196 on 16/02 (CW). Smaller numbers were at BHP Warren Farm, POA from 10/01-4/02 with a maximum of 20 on 16/01 (SD). Also recorded from Dyserth where 10 were with greylags on 8/02 (MC, GC); FLQ 2 on 21/01 (KS), and a single bird at Rhyl Marine Lake on 26/01(DR). Pre-Christmas/ winter records were confined to a single bird present at various sites around the Dee from 7/10-30/12(CW, KS, et al).

Greater White-fronted Goose (Anser albifrons)

GWYDD DALCEN-WEN

Scarce winter visitor, Red List, WBAP

2004

Flints. 7 at Border Pool, IMF on 5/12 (CW).

2005

Flints. Two present at various sites around the Dee Estuary 6/01-8/03.

2006 No records received.

Greylag Goose (Anser anser)

GWYDD WYLLT

Winter visitor and uncommon breeding resident.

2004

Denbs. 10 were at Holt on 21/02 (DOJ), at Trevalyn Meadows on the 28/02 (KS), and 9 at Gresford Flash, Wrexham on 5/03 (KS). That autumn 6 were again seen at Trevalyn Meadows on 2/11 (NF).

Flints. Reports throughout the year of 1-4 birds, probably of feral origin from FLQ. A single bird at Shotwick/IMF from 11-14/04. In the autumn 4 again at FLQ on 6/11(KS).

2005

Denbs. One on the River Clwyd at Nant Lewis Alyn from 27/02-08/03 (ELJ); and 2 at Gresford Flash, Wrexham from 29-31/08 (KS).

Flints. No records.

2006

Denbs. Two birds, probably of feral origin, at Gresford Flash, Wrexham on 8/06 (KS) and 2 birds, probably feral, at CON on 29-30/03, with 1 at CON on 15/10 (pALD).

Flints. 18 at Oakenholt Marsh, Dee Estuary from 23-26/01 (CL, GR), 1-2 remaining in the Shotwick area until 12/02 (AN, ABG). 12 were again at Oakenholt on 12/10 (AW), and a single bird at CQNR on 30/12 (KS).

Brent Goose (Branta bernicla)

GWYDD DDU

Regular winter visitor in small numbers. Amber List.

Recorded particularly in the Dee Estuary. Most records relate to the pale-bellied race which breeds in Greenland and Svalbard, wintering in the UK, Eire and Denmark. BHP Warren Farm, at POA is the most favoured site for this species.

2004

Flints. A flock of up to 46 was regularly at Warren Farm, POA from 7/01-9/02 (SD, JH, RS, ABG); and 3 of the dark-bellied race were with them on the 8/01; 17 at Oakenholt Marsh on 5/04 (JH) was an unusually late record. The first returning birds at POA were 6 on 31/10 (CW), with numbers building to 30 by 14/12 (KL), when 25 of the dark-bellied race were also reported from the same site (RS).

2005

Flints. Numbers at BHP Warren Farm peaked at 58 on 11/01 (SD), but only 8 were present for the last record of spring on 15/01 (RS,CW). Wintering birds were first recorded on 4/11 when 50 were again at Warren Farm (LJ), though numbers for the remainder of the year were more usually 14-16.

2006

Flints. Numbers increased with up to 95 at POA 4-5/01(ELJ), 37 on 18/01 was the last record of spring (GR). The first record of the autumn was a single bird on 7/09 (GR), but it was not until 8/11 when 22 and a single dark-bellied (GR) were the first substantial influx of the autumn. The pre-Christmas peak was 78 on 6/12 (GR). There were also 2-3 birds of the dark bellied race at CQNR 30-31/12 (KS, AW, ABG).

Common Shelduck (Tadorna tadorna)

HWYADEN YR EITHIN

Scarce breeding resident and very common estuarine winter visitor. Amber List.

The Dee Estuary is a site of International Importance for this species.

2004

Denbs. 25+ were near Rossett on 20/02 (DOJ). 40 were on the River Clwyd at Rhyl on 19/04 (KS) and 10 were at CON on 15/05 (RMB). Two birds were at Borras Quarry in June (LW). Two adults and a juvenile were offshore at Towyn on 9/10 (SM).

Flints. Highest counts at OMR were 450 on 15/09, 390 on 14/11 and 212 on 30/12. Peak count at POA was 950 on 19/09 (RH) with 500 there on 31/10 but the highest count of the year was 2,800 at Bagillt on 7/09 (RH). Inland, two were at Llyn Helyg on 6/03 (ELJ) with 4 there on 17/04 (DOJ). A male and female were at Fenn's Moss on 21/03 (KD).

2005

Denbs. Inland, 11 were on the River Dee floods at Holt on 23/01 (NF) and 8 at Fenn's Moss on 11/05 (THu). 27 were on the Afon Clwyd at Nant Lewis Alyn on 27/02 (ELJ). On the coast 40 were on the S side of Rhyl on 23/04 (SM) and small numbers at Towyn and Kinmel Baypeak 8 at Towyn on 6/11 (SM).

Flints. Largest numbers were again at BB with 2,250 on 30/08 (RH). POA held 1,000 on 24/09

and OMR 450 on 19/09. Inland birds were seen on the River Dee floods at Worthenbury with 4 on 16/11 (NFr). Breeding was proved at Rhuddlan on the River Clwyd where 2 adults with 4 chicks were seen on 30/05 (SH) and then 32 adults with 10 juveniles on 7/06 (SM).

2006

Denbs. In the early part of the year up to 5 birds were on the Afon Clwyd, Denbigh on the 28/01 (ELJ), 15 were seen at CON on 4/02 (DCR) and 6 were present at Pensarn on 15/2 (SM). Breeding was proven in the Rhyl area when 2 adults were seen with 10 juveniles on 31/05 (RMB). Two pairs were seen at Fenn's Moss on 11/06 (NH) suggesting possible breeding in this area. In the latter part of the year the peak count was of 20 birds at Pensarn on 18/02 (SM).

Flints. Most records were from the Dee Estuary with 150 birds at OMR on 4/01 and 50 at POA on 5/01 (GR) while 30 were on the River Clwyd on 11/01(DCR). Highest counts in the early part of the year were 200 at Flint on 13/01 (JR) and 222 at OMR on 30/01 (GR). Inland, birds were seen at Llyn Helyg on 6/01 (ELJ), a single at Ridleywood on 15/03 (NFr) and a pair were at Hendre on 22/04 (PD). Breeding was proven at Rhuddlan with a pair seen with 3 juveniles on 26/05, 13 juveniles were seen at CQNR on 14/08 (CL) while 14 juveniles were seen at Rhuddlan on 5/08 (SH). Peak counts in early summer were 531 at OMR on 3/07 (GR) and 500 at POA on 26/06 (GR). Peak counts for the year were 1,200 at POA on 26/10 (GR) and 600 at OMR on 11/09 (GR).

Mandarin Duck (Aix galericulata)

HWYADEN FANDARIN

Scarce breeding resident.

2004

Denbs. The highest count was for 23 at Holt on 28/03 (NF). A single drake was seen at Llangollen on both 27 and 28/03, a pair was seen at Holt on 18/4 and two birds were there again on 1/05. A drake was reported flying down the river at Pont Canol, Denbigh on 13/05, and a further two pairs were reported at Erddig pool, Wrexham on 22/11 and 29/12.

Flints. The only record was of a single drake on Border Pool at IMF on 28/04.

2005

Denbs. A single drake was reported at Llangollen on 10/04 and 25/10, and a pair was seen at Fron Fawr, Llangollen on 14/04. A single drake was seen in Garden Village, Wrexham on 1/05. At Holt a drake was reported on 3/05, a female with young on 18/06, 7 birds on 23/07 (NF), and a single bird on 11/08. 2 birds were seen at Almere and one at Trevalyn Meadows on 7/08.

Flints. A pair was seen S of Mold on 19/05 (JW).

2006

Denbs. The highest count was of 10+ at Almere on 4/03 (NHu). A single drake was seen at Llangollen on 11 and 31/03, and at Britannia Inn, Llangollen on 26/03. One pair was seen at Holt on 15/04 and four drakes were reported there on 28/05 (NF). Two were at Corwen on 16/04 and one was at CON on 23/11. One male was at Acton Park, Wrexham on 6, 9, and 28/12 (KS).

Flints. There were no records this year.

CHWIWELL

Common winter visitor. Amber List.

The Dee Estuary is a site of national importance in Great Britain for this species.

2004

Denbs. Maximum coastal counts of 250 at Kinmel Bay and 100 at Towyn on 2/01 (SM), 250+ near Rossett on 21/02 (DOJ) and 330 at Rhyl Marine Lake on 21/01 (RMB). Inland records from Hanmer with 110 on 27/01 (HL); the Dee flood plain had a number of records with 24 at Trevalyn on 8/02 (NF) and 150 on 1/11 (NFr); large count of 1,100 at Worthenbury on 28/10 (NFr).

Flints.





Grey Heron (Ardea cinerea)

GREYR GLAS

Widespread resident.

The Dee Estuary is a site of national importance in Great Britain. Despite this being a common species, few heronries are known and counted regularly.

Inland: a peak count of 4 birds at Holt on 28/03 (NF). 3 birds were seen on a number of occasions at Wrexham, Erddig pool on 27/06 and 5/05 (NH) and at Gresford Flash on 3/05 (KS). 2 birds were seen at WBQ on 1/05 (LW). Coastal: the peak count was of 8 birds at Walwen marsh, Bagillt on 25/01 and 14/11 (JH, RH) and 8 at OMR on 30/12 (DNS). CQNR/OMR and POA were the principal recording sites. There were 7 birds on the coastal fields at POA on 18/07 (pSD). The River Clwyd had 6 birds on 21/06 (DCR).

2005

Denbs. Inland: heronry consisting of 5 nests on the River Clwyd at Nant Lewis Alyn where up to 17 birds were recorded on 2/04 (ELJ). A single bird was recorded on a garden lawn in Llanddulas on 29/01 (EL). Other large counts included 12 at Nant Lewis Alyn on 27/02 and 8/03 (ELJ) and 10 at Erddig on 26/02 (NH). Hen Harrier (Circus cyaneus)

BOD TINWEN

Scarce breeding species and winter visitor. Red List.

2004

Denbs. Sixteen records came from three areas – Mynydd Hiraethog, RM and Fenn's Moss mainly between Mar and Jul. There were records of 2 ringtails together on 14/04 and three together on 12/07 on RM.

Flints. Of the six records, one was from POA and the others from the IMF/CQNR area, mainly in the early months (Jan to Mar) with one record at Shotwick in Oct.

Denbs. Thirty one records from the same three areas – the first, a male at Glasfryn on 9/01, and seven records from RM in Jan and Feb. Eleven records were from the three main areas between Mar and Jul with 12 more records from RM and Fenn's Moss between Oct and Dec.

Flints. Four records were from POA in Jan (1), Apr (2) and Dec (1) and one record from CQNR on 3/10 and one from OMNR on 22/11.

2006

Denbs. Of the eighteen records, there was a male on Mynydd Hiraethog on 10/02, and on RM there were two records of 3 ringtails together on 16/01 and 18/02, a male and female on 13/04 and 3 birds together on 4/11 and 28/12. Others were of a single male in the Ceiriog valley in two places on 11/06, so possibly the same bird seen twice. Breeding success was lower than in other years, probably affected by a poor vole year or other factors.

(21/01) and at Gresford Flash (12/03). In Towyn, Collared Dove was frequently a prey species (SM).

Flints. There were forty six records from every month except Feb, most of which were of single birds. Records of 2 birds came from SS (4/01), Rhuddlan (2/08) and Hawarden (10/10). There was an exceptional record of 5 birds during a BBS walk at Dyserth on 18/04 (MrsL).

Breeding. Recorded at one nest with a minimum of 1 egg, leading to 1 fledged young (WRSG).

2005

Denbs. Sixty records, with birds recorded every month, but with a lack of sightings reported from the S and W of the County. Most records were of single birds, but on 1/04 4 birds were seen at Fenn's Moss; 4 nestlings were ringed near Llanarmon-yn-lal on 15/07; and on 9/09 2 birds were seen circling together at Towyn.

Flints. There were fifty six records from every month, mainly of single birds. On 15/04 at Greenfield, 2 birds were seen; on 29/04 and again on 26/07 at Rhuddlan, 2 birds were seen; on 22/10 S of Rhyl, 2 birds; and at Llanasa on 27/12 there were 2 birds hunting a flock of finches.

Breeding. Recorded at 2 nests with a count of 7 eggs leading to 5 fledged young, a mean of 2.5 young per brood (WRSG).

2006

Denbs. Of the sixty five records from every month, all but one were of single birds except for a sighting of 2 females at Towyn on 12/09. There were three records from the western part of the County.

Flints. There were sixty records, from every month, mainly of single birds, though 2+ birds were seen at Queensferry on 1/01; 2 were seen at POA on 6/02, 2 males were seen at Rhuddlan on 6/03 and 30/06, and 2 unsexed birds were seen there on 15/09 and 7/10.





Denbs. There were eleven records of single birds at 7 locations. Late winter records were from RM (5/01) and Holt (24/01). A f near Llanarmon-yn-lal on 25/04 allowed close approach in a car as she sat on a hedge (PMR). Other records were on Mynydd Hiraethog (30/10), RM (4/11) and three at CON on 4/12, 8/12 and 18/12 may have been of the same bird.

Flints. There were forty records of singles from 8 locations from each month of the year except Jun. Twenty eight records were from POA though some of these on the same date were probably the same bird (recorded there each month except Jan, May, Jun) and 6 winter records from OMR (in Jan, Feb and Dec). Flints. There were six records from 5 locations. The first two records were probably the same bird at Gronant dunes on 17/06. Other records were. S of Rhyl on 22/06, Queensferry on 30/07, SS on 1/08 (possibly the same bird as seen at Queensferry), and at Rhyl on 11/08

2005

Denbs. There were eighteen records from 8 locations. The earliest was on 24/04 at Fenn's Moss where there were 1-5 (on 12/05, THu) birds. There were four records of a single bird near Penycae, three of which between 14/05 and 1/06 may well have been the same bird. Other sightings were on RM (23/06) hunting moths (JLR), at Eglwyseg (26/06), Almere (07/08), Trevalyn meadows (7/08) – probably the same bird as seen at Almere – 2 near Bettisfield on 31/08 and near Borras on 1/09.

Flints. There were ten records from 5 locations. The earliest was on 1/05 at SS and again on 31/07. Other records were a single at Rhuddlan on 20/07 that was seen diving at, but missing, House Martins and Swifts (SH); two records of a single near Rhydymwyn on 3/08 and 10/08

Breeding. Recorded at 1 nest with a minimum of 2 eggs, leading to 2 fledged young (Anon via WRSG). This is the first known breeding within NE Wales in the last 15 years.

2006

Denbs. There were twenty two records from 8 locations. The earliest record was of 3 on 23/04 at Fenn's Moss and there were ten other records from that area of between 1-7 (on 14/05, JuR) birds. Thee were six records near Penycae of singles on 12/05, 13/06, 24/06, 28/06, 29/06 and 22/07. Other records were: 1 at Llanbedr DC on 10/06 and 6/07, 1 at Moel Famau (16/06), 1 near Llangynhafal (17/06) and Rossett on 4/08.



The Dee Estuary is an internationally important site for this species. The largest flocks are found there but this species can be seen anywhere on the Clwyd coast. Peak numbers occur in Jan/Feb (9450 in Jan 2005) and Oct/Nov (14680 in Oct 2006). Unusually high numbers (8600) were also reported in the Dee estuary in Aug 2005. POA has birds present all year, including non-breeders in Apr-Jun. Less than ten records of breeding attempts are submitted each year but they include both inland and coastal sites.

2004

Denbs. Reported in moderate numbers along the whole length of the coast with peak numbers in spring of 400+ on 15/01 at Horton's Nose, 300+ on 13/03 at Pensarn, and 300+ on 13/03 at Towyn. Lower numbers were recorded in autumn, peaking at 300 at Rhyl Marine Lake on 7/11 and 300+ on 31/12 at Horton's Nose.

Breeding success at Llyn Brenig was confirmed when 2 adults accompanied by 2 juveniles were seen on 1/06 (BE). Singles were reported from Gresford Flash on 5/04 and Bettisfield on 19/05 (KS) and Nant y Ffrith reservoir on 28/07 (SD).

Flints. Monthly maxima for Dee estuary locations are shown below (data provided by WeBS counts, JH, RH, DNS/DN, DCR and KS):

The peak spring count on the Irish Sea coast was at Gronant (1500 on 10/03 (pRS)) with smaller counts there of 200 on 10/01 and 150 on 3/05 and 200 on 11/03 S of Rhyl. In autumn, 200 were S of Rhyl on 4/08 and 130 were counted at Prestatyn on 31/10.

Breeding pairs were present at SS from 15/03 through to July (PT), E of Queensferry from 26/03 to 21/06 and at Shotwick Boating Lake on 24/04 (DOJ).

Denbs. Numbers along the coast were slightly higher than in 2004, with maxima of 500 recorded at Llanddulas on 3/03 and 8/12. Towyn regularly had good numbers, with 400 on 26/02. Smaller flocks were present at many locations on the coast.

Breeding was not proved but two birds were seen at Holt on 3/05 (NF) and singles were at Gresford Flash on 28/03 and 16/05; Brynygrog on 16/04; and Fenn's Moss on 5/05.

Flints. Numbers in the Dee Estuary were higher at POA in spring compared to 2004 but lower elsewhere and lower in all sectors in autumn. The monthly maxima drawn from WeBS counts and individual records are shown below.

Birds were present during the breeding season at a small number of sites in Denbs. and Flints., although breeding success has not been confirmed.

Denbs. Gresford Flash had 1 on 3/04, 2 on 28/04 and 1 on 15/05 (KS). Borras Quarry had 2 in July (LW).

Flints. FLQ had 1 on 26/03 (KD) and 2 were reported on various dates from 29/03 to 11/05. IMF had 1 on 31/03 (pCW) and 2 from 1/04 to 3/05. Two were reported on 5-6/08 at POA.

2005

Denbs. Only one record of a single at Gresford Flash on 19/04.

Flints. The earliest arrivals, two birds, were recorded at FLQ on 2/04 (KS); and on various occasions to 9/05. SS had a single on 3/04 and POA had one on 10/04. Inner Marsh Farm had numbers building up to 3 between 12/05 and 14/05 but had a record count (11 birds) on 26/07. POA had a single on 24/07.

2006



Small groups can be seen along the whole of the Clwyd coast. POA in Aug is the best site for larger flocks of birds on passage, with a peak of 350, but spring flocks rarely exceed 50 birds. Breeding was confirmed each year from a small number of sites.



2004

Denbs. Maxima of 17 at CON on 3/01; 10 at Llanddulas on 9/02; 10 at Kinmel Bay on 8/03; 50 at Pensarn on 19/08; 100+ at Kinmel Bay on 14/10; and 45 at Towyn on 14/11.

Flints. Present at many locations in the Dee estuary. Peak counts of 54 at Flint saltmarsh on 25/01; 40 at Gronant on 3/05; 266 at POA on 22/08; and 40+ at Prestatyn on 31/10. Two adults were seen with 2 juveniles at Gronant on 18/07 (JuR).

2005

Denbs. In spring 30 were recorded on 26/01 at Kinmel Bay and 20 on 28/01 at Pensarn. Autumn numbers were

slightly lower. Breeding attempts were recorded, with nests at Towyn and Kinmel Bay in early May (SM).

Flints. The largest spring flocks were 40 at POA on 8/02, 30 at Gronant (1/05) and Rhyl Harbour (7/05). In autumn, 66 were seen at Gronant on 6/11 (ELV). One nesting attempt was reported at POA, with an adult sitting on a late nest on 17/07 (JuR).

2006

Denbs. Present in small numbers along the coast. Autumn saw 30+ at CON on 9/09, 75 at Kinmel Bay on 22/09 and 30 at CON on 27/12. No breeding attempts were recorded.

Flints. Numbers in spring were low, with a maximum of 40 birds seen at Gronant. The autumn

passage brought much larger flocks, especially at POA where numbers built up from 100 on 13/08 to 350 on 26/08 before falling back to 300 on 7/09 and a more typical 20 by 8/10. Breeding was confirmed at Gronant where 5 were seen (11/07)

European Golden Plover (Pluvialis apricaria)

CWTIAD AUR

Scarce breeding resident and winter visitor. Red List.

This species has been seen at both coastal and inland locations, usually in very small numbers (less than 5) but larger flocks occasionally occur on the coast, with IMF/ Shotwick fields the favoured area. There has been one record of successful breeding.

2004

Denbs. Winter coastal sightings of 2 at CON on 8/02; 6 at Llanddulas on 9/02 and 1 at Towyn on 6/10. Inland records include singles at RM on 12/02, 14/04 and 27/09 (JLR); 2 E of Hem House (SJ3955) on 21/02; and 2 at Mwdwl-eithin, Mynydd Hiraethog on 21/06. Successful breeding confirmed on 18/06 at Llyn Aled with 2 adults and 3 juveniles (NH).

Flints. Two were seen at Inner Marsh Farm and 1 at River Clwyd, Rhyl on 3/01. Three were at Rhyl on 29/07. All other sightings were at POA: 22 on 25/02 (pSD); singles on 4/03, 25/04 and 3/08; 2 on 12/09; 3 on 6/10 and 1 on 3/11.

2005

Denbs. Four records included 30+ birds S of Towyn on2/02 (SM) and 2 singles on RM on 2/05 (JLR)

Flints. There were three sightings of single birds from POA between 11/02 and 15/02 and autumn sightings of 2 birds at POA (5/09) and S of Rhyl (11/09). Larger numbers were seen at Border Pool, Inner Marsh Farm, with 20 present on 14/10 (KS) and 13 on 21/10.

2006

Denbs. Sightings at CON included 2 birds on 3-4/02, a single on 19/09 and 2 on 18/10. One was seen flying W and then turning inland at Towyn on 17/12. The only inland sighting was a single on RM on 26/04.

Flints. The earliest bird was a single on 8/01 at OMR. At Border Pool, Inner Marsh Farm, 30 were seen on 3/02 but nearby Shotwick fields held a flock of 130 on 12/02 and another flock throughout April, building from 31 on 2/04 to 90 on 16/04 before reducing to 40 on 23/04 and 2 on 9/05. Limited numbers elsewhere include at POA (1 on 23/08 and 2 on 24/09), OMR (1 on 8/09 and 2 on 25/11) and S of Rhyl (3 on 30/09).

Grey Plover (Pluvialis squatarola)

CWTIAD LLWYD

Winter visitor and passage migrant. Amber List.

The Dee estuary is a site of national importance but only small numbers are found on the Welsh side, concentrated at POA. A flock of 800 on 29/01/2005 was exceptional.

2004

Denbs. Singles were reported at Towyn on 17/11 and Kinmel Bay on 25/11(SM).

Flints. POA had peak counts of 81 on 22/02, 44 on 4/03, 80 on 12/10, and 200 on 14/11(JH/RH). OMR had 1 on 6/01 and 2 on 22/01 and 80 were seen NW of Gronant on 31/10 (ELJ).

2005

Denbs. Two birds observed at Kinmel Bay on 16/01 was the only record in 2005.

Flints. POA accounted for 42 out of 48 records. Only single figure counts were made during the summer (Mar – Aug) but for the winter season numbers between 20-50 birds are regular. Several observers (pRS, pCW) recorded a flock of 800 on 29/01; numbers also built up in December to 86. Birds were also seen at Gronant, with a maximum of 40 on 17/10.

2006

Denbs. Sightings of 1 or 2 birds along the coast in early spring, with a peak of 12 on 13/02 at CON.

Flints. Numbers at POA fell from 80 on 5/01 to 50 by 6/03 but built up again in autumn to a peak of 100 on 26/10. Small numbers, usually less than 5, were seen at a variety of sites on the coast and estuary and Gronant had 12 on 3/02.

Northern Lapwing (Vanellus vanellus)

CORNCHWIGLEN

Breeding resident, passage migrant and winter visitor. Red List. WBAP

This species is recorded in moderate numbers at coastal and inland locations throughout NE Wales during winter months (see map). The coastal areas around Rhyl and the Dee estuary at OMR / CQNR hold the largest flocks (with maxima of 2000 in Dec 2006 and 4000 in Jan 2004 respectively) but flocks of up to 500 can be seen regularly at inland sites, with a maximum of 1200 in the Dee valley during floods. Birds were observed during the breeding season in a wide variety of locations but in small numbers.


2004

Denbs. Maxima of 400 at CON on 9/01 and 2000 at KBRH on 21/01. Smaller flocks in autumn, with a maximum of 230 at Towyn.

For inland sites there was an exceptionally high count of 1200 on 10/02 E of Ridleywood during flooding of the Dee valley (NFr). Other counts included 400 at Trevalyn Meadows on 21/01 and 400 at Gresford Flash on 22/01. The Dee valley again had good flocks in autumn, with 450 on 28/10 at Worthenbury and 600 on 3/11at Trevalyn Meadows.

Breeding records include 8 pairs at Francis Lane, Wrexham on 25/03, and 9 birds at Pont Canal, Denbigh on 13/05 (ELJ). These and records from ten other sites are shown on the map below.

Flints. Counts along the Flintshire coast and Dee estuary in autumn / winter were larger than in recent years. Monthly maxima are shown in the table.

Rhyl* sightings include Rhyl Marine Lake and River Clwyd, Rhyl. Data provided by WeBS (JH/RH); DNS/DN; RMB, DCR, pSD; and ELJ) SS recorded a large flock of 900+ on 4/01. No flocks of more than 50 birds were reported away from the coastal strip.

2005


Denbs. Comparatively low numbers were reported this year. On the coast, the largest flocks were at Belgrano beach (220 on 22/01) and inland, flocks of 500 were seen at Gresford Flash (4/01and 26/12).

The coastal areas around Towyn had some breeding activity but data from BBS and individual records showed most breeding was recorded inland (see map). These include 22 birds on 19/04 W of Ruabon and 13 pairs at CON throughout the season. Post-breeding groups were reported at Penycae, Tainant (70+ on 14/06), at Fenn's Moss (35 on 19/06) and Nant y Ffrith reservoir (33 on 11/07).

Flints. Numbers recorded in winter months on the N coastal strip and in the Dee estuary (shown below) were also lower than in 2004.

IMF recorded a maximum of 250+ on 22/10.



Breeding activity was reported from three locations, including 22 adults at Sandycroft on 24/04 and 13 on 12/06 (IMS).

2006

Denbs. Occasional sightings of large flocks in the coastal area during winter months, including 500 on 23/01 at Towyn and 1000 on 30/12 at KBRH. Inland, flocks were seen at Dinbren Isaf, Llangollen (200 on 3/01) and Gresford Flash (300 on 21/01).

Records of breeding attempts increased to 16, none of which were for the coastal area except CON. The map shows the distribution of breeding

sites across Clwyd recorded in 2004 -06. It represents only 100-150 pairs per year.

Flints. The Dee estuary and Flintshire coast again held large winter flocks, with the Rhyl area and OMR / CQNR favoured locations. Monthly maxima are shown below.

Other coastal flocks reported include 1000 on 31/12 at SS. The only significant inland flocks included an unusual mid-summer group of 200 on 14/06 at Sandycroft (AW). The area SE of Rhuddlan held flocks throughout the winter, peaking at 650 on 16/12.

It was a mixed year for breeding attempts in Flintshire; 9 records showed some successes, with the largest concentration of adults (11) seen at Sandycroft on 23/04, but ELJ's comment about Nant Lewis Alyn, Denbigh "What a sad site – one!" summed up the fragility of the population at recognised breeding sites.

Red Knot (Calidris canutus)

PIBYDD YR ABER

Passage migrant and winter visitor. Red List.

The Dee estuary is a site of international importance for this species but although numbers on the Flintshire side of the estuary held up well in 2005, counts in spring 2004 and autumn 2006 were relatively low. The main sites are POA and OMR / CQNR; this species is uncommon along the Denbighshire coast.

2004

Denbs. Very small numbers were recorded; 35 were at Pensarn on 21/11 (SM).

Flints. Numbers recovered from 2003 lows. Monthly maxima (from data provided by WeBS (JH/RH), DNS/DN, pSD, NH and ELJ) are shown below.

Sanderling (Calidris alba)

PIBYDD Y TYWOD

Passage migrant and winter visitor.

The Dee estuary is a site of national importance but significant sightings at estuary locations other than POA are unusual. Sightings along the coast from POA westwards occur regularly, usually in small groups of up to 40 birds with occasional larger flocks of up to 200 in spring and 300 in autumn.

2004

Denbs. Numbers were small early in the year but Kinmel Bay had 150 on 8/03. Autumn counts include 200 on 14/10 at Kinmel Bay and 150 on 14/11 at Towyn. There was an inland record of a single bird on 9/05 at Gresford Flash (KS).

Flints. Gronant had a late spring flock of 88 on 16/06 (pRS). In autumn, 120 on 31/10 at

Prestatyn, 100 on 1/12 at Rhyl and a flock of 100 on 26/10 at Flint Docks.

2005

Denbs. Small flocks were recorded along the coast but Towyn had 80 on 13/01 and a late spring influx brought 130 to Towyn on 31/05. In autumn there was a maximum of 290 at Towyn on 6/12.

Flints. POA had 80 on 9/01 and 200 on 2/03 but that flock had reduced to 75 by 2/06. Gronant had 50 on 3/06. In autumn, numbers steadily increased with 80 at Gronant on 17/10, 150 NE of Rhyl on 10/11.

2006

Denbs. Numbers were low in spring, with 50 on 28/02 at Towyn. Autumn flocks were larger but still modest in comparison to 2005 - Kinmel Bay had 138 on 3/11 and Towyn had 60 on 16/12.

Flints. Also, low spring numbers with maximum of 40 on 15/01 at POA. In autumn, Rhyl had 72 on 12/07.

Little Stint (Calidris minuta)

PIBYDD BACH

Very scarce passage migrant, usually found on autumn passage.

2004

Denbs. Singles were seen at CON on 7/09 and 14/09 (pALD).

Flints. The first record of the year was for 2 birds at POA on 1/09 (pSD). A single bird was at Shotwick Boating Lake on 16/10.

2005

Denbs. No records.

Flints. POA provided an unusual early record, one being seen on 26/02 (pCW). In early autumn, as part of an influx of migrants, 6 birds were reported on 11/09 by the River Clwyd at Rhyl (CR,SM) and 2 at the same location on 16/09.

2006

Denbs. The earliest sightings were up to 4 birds at CON between 11-14/06 (pALD). In Oct CON had ten records of a single bird, probably the same bird.

Flints. CQNR had a single on 9/08. Two birds were present at River Clwyd, Rhyl on 1/10 and 2 birds were in the CQNR / OMR area on 7-8/10.

Temminck's Stint (Calidris temminkii)

PIBYDD TEMMINCK

Rare migrant.

Only one record in the reporting period.

2004

Denbs. There was 1at CON on 15/05 (pALD).

Curlew Sandpiper (Calidris ferruginea)

PIBYDD CAMBIG

Scarce autumn passage migrant. WBAP

Three main locations to see this species are all in Flintshire – POA; River Clwyd, Rhyl; and OMR / CQNR. The only sightings from Denbighshire were from CON in 2006. The autumn passage spans from late Aug to mid-Oct. but there was also one record of a spring migrant in 2006.

2004

Denbs. A single was seen at CQNR/ OMR on 1/10.

Flints. POA had at most 2 birds on 6 dates between 22/08 and 19/09 and 1 on 17/10 (RH, pRS, KS). River Clwyd, Rhyl had birds on 28/08, 12/09, 19/09 and 9/10.

2005

Denbs. No records.

Flints. The earliest and latest birds were singles at POA on 22/08 and 7/10 (CR/RH). Up to 6 were seen at River Clwyd, Rhyl between 27/08 and 29/08, and 8 at POA on 1/09. The first record for OMR was 2 birds on 2/09. River Clwyd, Rhyl had a total of 21 birds observed on 5 dates between 27/08 and 20/09. POA and OMR had totals of 12 and 8 respectively.

2006

Denbs. CON had 1 or 2 birds between 17-19/09, the earliest for the autumn passage, and a single bird was seen on 7-8/10.

Flints. An unusual sighting in spring of 2 at River Clwyd, Rhyl on 21/03. Two were seen at the same location on 26/08 and 2 on 24/09 at POA. All other records occurred in Oct. with up to 7 counted at CQNR/OMR between 5-8/10 and a late migrant on 23/10.

Purple Sandpiper (Calidris maritima)

PIBYDD DU

Winter visitor in very small numbers.

Records from Rhos-on-Sea, the main site for this species in north-east Wales, are now excluded because it falls outside VC 50. There were no records in 2004 and only one each in the later years.

2005

Denbs. The only sighting was a small flock of 10+ birds at Towyn on 21/10 (SM)

2006

Denbs. One bird seen on the sea wall at TB on 9/11 (SM)

Dunlin (Calidris alpina)

PIBYDD Y MAWN

Passage migrant and common winter visitor. Amber List.

The Dee estuary is an internationally important site for wintering Dunlin and flocks seen on the

Flints. coast contribute to that status. The largest monthly total (12,400) was in Dec 2004 but numbers did not exceed 6,500 in 2005 and 2006. Small flocks are seen along the Denbs. coast but flocks of 100+ are unusual.

2004

Denbs. All records were coastal except for 1 at Gresford Flash on 10/05 (KS). Peak spring counts were 500+ at Belgrano on 22/01, 400 at Kinmel Bay on 8/03, and 142 at Llanddulas on 13/03. Autumn peaks were 400 at Towyn on 14/11 and 200 at Kinmel Bay on 3/12 (SM, RMB, DCR).

Flints. Monthly maxima, (from data provided by WeBS (JH/RH), DNS/DN, pSD, RMB, NH and ELJ) are shown below.

Ruff (Philomachus pugnax)

PIBYDD TORCHOG

Scarce passage migrant.

2004

Flints. An early passage was recorded this year, with birds observed on 4 dates in Jan. The first was seen at OMR on 6/01 (JH), followed by 3 at CQNR on 7/01, 1 at OMR on 22/01 and 2 on 24/01 at CQNR. Autumn passage brought a juvenile to IMF on 20/08 (KS) and 4 birds to River Clwyd, Rhyl on 5/09 (JuR).

2005

Flints. No birds were recorded on the spring passage but there was a better showing in autumn. OMR had the earliest birds, with 2 on 17/08, a juvenile on 29/08, and 2 birds on 5/09 and 11/09. River Clwyd, Rhyl also recorded 2 on 11/09 and one was seen at Rhuddlan on the same day. A single was seen at SS on 2/10 and 3 at Inner Marsh Farm on 21/10.

2006

Denbs. The only record for the vice-county during the three year period 2004-06 was a single bird seen at CON on 26/09.

Flints. An early sighting of 2 birds on 4/01 at OMR turned out to be the only spring record. Early autumn migrants were recorded at POA on 27/08 (2 birds) and 26/08 (1) and S of Rhyl on27/08 (1). Later migrants were sighted in the Dee estuary, a single at SS on 17/09 and 2 at CQNR on 26/09.

Jack Snipe (Lymnocryptes minimus)

GIACH FACH

Scarce migrant and winter visitor.

The habit of this species to sit tight unless flushed makes them difficult to detect but there were sightings from coastal and inland sites in both vice-counties.

2004

Denbs. Fenn's Moss had 2 on 26/01(EHEM), 4 on 5/02 (SA) and 4 on 4/03 (DHo). A single bird was seen at Holt on 28/12 (NF)

Flints. Singles were seen S of Halkyn on 10/01 (DOJ) and at Gronant on 30/01 (DCR) and 2/03 (CR).

2005

Two sightings, one at Gronant, Flintshire on 27/01 flushed whilst checking an area for Common Snipe (27 flushed) and the second at CON, Denbighshire on 27/12 (DCR).

2006


Denbs. The first of the year was seen at Holt on 2/01. All other sightings (10) were at CON with 3 each in Jan and Dec, 2 in Feb and 1 in Mar and Nov. The only occasion when more than 1 bird was seen was 26/01 when 4 were recorded.

Common Snipe (Gallinago gallinago)

GIACH GYFFREDIN

Rare breeding resident; passage migrant and winter visitor. Amber List.

This species is difficult to detect because of its habit to sit tight unless flushed and is probably significantly under-recorded. It is present in small numbers at inland sites, mainly in Denbs., and at coastal sites. All records of possible breeding were in Denbs., with a maximum of 3 in 2006.



2004

Denbs. There were only 3 coastal records, all from Towyn, with a maximum of 9 on 9/12 (SM). Inland records were from 6 sites but concentrated at Fenn's Moss which had birds present for 8 months (excluding May-Aug), with maxima of 15 on 5/02 (SA) and 23 on 25/09 (JPA) and Borras Quarry which had birds present in all months except Jun-Aug with a maximum of 30 in Jan (LW). There was only one breeding record of a bird "chippering" W of Gwynfryn on 30/04 (JLR).

Flints. Small numbers were present along much of the Flintshire coast, with maxima of 14 NW of Gronant on

7/03 (ELJ) and 8 at POA on 27/09 (KS). Birds were noted at 3 inland sites.

2005

Denbs. Nine sightings at Fenn's Moss had counts of 1-5 birds but 24 were seen on 17/01(EHEM). Trevalyn meadows had 23 on 16/01 and 42 on 16/03 (NF), the highest count for Clwyd in 2005. There were 10 birds at Wrexham Ind. Estate on 20/02 and 8 were seen at Nant Lewis Alyn, Denbigh on 27/02 and 8/03. In autumn Mynydd Hiraethog had 4 on 17/09 and Nant y Ffrith reservoir had 6 on 9/10. On the coast, 19 were seen S of Pensarn on 26/11 and 12 at CON on 27/12. A single bird was recorded SE of Capel Siloam on 14/05 during a BBS visit.

Flints. Small numbers, mainly at coastal sites. 27 were seen at Gronant on 27/01 and POA had regular sightings throughout spring and autumn, with a maximum of 11 on 8/03 at Warren Farm. Autumn records include 9 SE of Rhuddlan on 23/09, and 8 at Bagillt on 3/12. The few inland sightings included 10 at Pentrehobin, Mold on 1/11. There were no records of breeding attempts in Flintshire.

2006

Denbs. Small numbers (<10) were present at coastal sites but two larger counts were made at CON on 18/01 and 13/02 (40 on each occasion). The highest count for inland sites was 9 on 14/04 at Erddig pool – birds were there throughout Mar-Apr. Numbers at other sites were

lower than in 2005 but birds were reported at a few new sites, including 7 on 5/03 E of Marford and 6 on 16/09 at Borras Pool. There were three sightings during the breeding season; BBS squares SW of Glynfryn (single on 26/04) and SE of Capel Siloam (single on 30/04 and 2 on 25/06); and the area E of Llandegla Forest had a "drumming" male on 10/05 (JuR).

Flints. Low numbers were seen at both coastal and inland sites; for the latter the only record of note was 13 seen NW of Rhuddlan on 21/02. At coastal sites, the area S of Rhyl had 10 on 2/03. Gronant had 12 on 6/03 and POA had 12 on 28/11.

Long-billed Dowitcher (Limnodromus scolopaceus)

GÏACH GYLFIN-HIR

Rare vagrant.

2005

Flints. At IMF, Border Pool 1 bird was seen on 14/10 (KS) and on 21/10 (JuR). Accepted by the BBRC.

Eurasian Woodcock (Scolopax rusticola)

CYFFYI OG

Scarce breeding resident and winter visitor. Amber List.

There were no coastal records

2004

Denbs. A single bird was seen at Rhuddlan on 19/11 (SH), and 2 birds seen at RM on 15/12 and 21/12 (JLR).

Flints. There was only a single record from the breeding season, of a single bird at Hawarden Castle on 19/06 (DCR). Other records were of single birds at Northop 1/01 (DOJ), Fenn's Moss 24/01 and 26/01 (JPA and EHEM), Rhydymwyn 27/02 (AB), SS on 24/10 (PT), Rhuddlan 31/10 (SH), Ewloe 14/11 (DOJ), Pantymwyn 13/12 (MB).

2005

Denbs. Again, there was only a single record from the breeding season, of a single bird at Cae Llwyd Reservoir, Penycae on 19/05 (JLR). Significant records were 5 birds flying from Newtown Forest to Penycae top reservoir on 14/03 (JLR) and 5 birds flushed during a partridge shoot at RM on 5/11 (JLR). At RM 3 birds were seen on 28/01 and 8/03 (JLR) and 2 birds were seen at Eglwyseg 17/01 (JLR), Loggerheads CP 23/11 (MB) and World's End 10/12 (JLR).

Flints. Only two records for Flintshire, both were of single birds at Rhuddlan on 18/11 and 9/12 (SH).

2006

Denbs. All but two records were from the first quarter of the year. At Plas y Fron, RM, 4 birds were seen (JAJ). At Llanarmon-yn-lal, 3 were recorded on 14/01 (PR) and Eglwyseg on 8/02 (JLR) whilst 2 birds were seen at Glyndyfrdwy on 28/03.

Flints. A single bird was seen roding at Llyn Helyg on 19/04 (ELJ). A single bird landed on a driveway in Llanasa on 1/12 (ELJ).

Black-tailed Godwit (Limosa limosa)

RHOSTOG GYNFFONDDU

Passage migrant. Principally a winter visitor but increasingly found through the year. Amber List.

The Dee Estuary is an internationally important site for this species. The principal site is OMR where a substantial wintering population roosts on the salt marsh at high tide. There is also a small summer population that appears to alternate between OMR and IMF.

2004

Denbs. Peak count away from the Dee Estuary was 45 at APMP, on 16/11 (SM). Six records from CON were received through the year, with a peak count of 31 occurring on 31/01 and 10/08 (pALD).

Flints. Peak counts were 4,200 at OMR on 22/01 (pRS), 5,220 at OMR on 19/09 (RH, DNS) and 4,260 at BB on 9/10 (RH). Peak counts for May-July were 240 at CQNR on 4/05 (DNS), 300 at OMR on 18/06 (DNS) and 300 at CQNR on 19/07 (DNS).

2005

Denbs. CON had 5 birds on 20/03 (DCR), 7 birds on 16/04 (DCR) and a single bird on 3/10 (RMB).

Flints. Oakenholt Marsh was again the principal site. Peak counts were in the latter half of the year with 5,000 birds recorded on 19/09, 17/10 and 11/06 (RH, AW). 5,700 were recorded on 12/10 (RH). Numbers for the first half of the year were lower; peak counts were of 2,620 birds on 29/03 and 3,000 on 11/04 (RH). Away from OMR/CQNR records 1,000+ were at Talacre on 1/12 (ELJ) and 500 at WF on 15/02 (pRS). 1,600+ were recorded offshore of POA on 2/12 (CR).

2006

Denbs. 16 at CON on 27/04 (pALD).

Flints. OMR/CQNR is the principal site for the fourth year running, although significantly more records were received than the previous two years. Records away from the Dee Estuary were 30+ at River Clwyd, Rhyl on 11/01 (DCR), 40 at Rhyl Marine Lake on 27/09 (RMB), and peak counts at OMR/CQNR were 3,809 on 27/11 (CM), 3,500 on 15/01 and 18/01 (GR), 3,100 on 13/02 (DNS). 2,000 were seen at CQNR on the Bunded pools on 28/08 (AW).

Bar-tailed Godwit (Limosa Iapponica)

RHOSTOG GYNFFRONFRITH

Passage migrant and winter visitor. Red List.

The Dee Estuary is a site of international importance in the UK. All records for this species are coastal.

2004

Denbs. Towyn had a single bird recorded on 14/01 (SM).

Flints. The principal sites for sightings were OMR and POA with additional records from Gronant dunes with a count of 43 birds on 2/03 (CR), Rhyl where a single bird was seen on 20/03 (BE) and then 30 birds seen on 3/08 (RMB) and Bagillt with a single bird on 22/11 (RH). The peak counts for the year were at Gronant with 43 birds on 2/03, Rhyl with 30 birds on 3/08 and POA, which held 90 on 12/12 (pSD).

2005

Denbs. A single record was from Towyn of 3 birds offshore on 17/10 (SM) and single birds at Belgrano beach on 29/01 and 19/02 (SM).

Flints. POA was again the principal site with only a few records from Oakenholt Marsh and Bagillt. Peak counts for the year were 44 on 12/02, 40+ on 2/10 and 30 on 22/10 all at POA (RH, pRS). The peak count for OMR was 11 on 10/03 (PCW). The only month that birds were not recorded was Jul.

2006

Denbs. All records were from CON., with single birds seen on 13 occasions and 4 on 9/04 and 2 on 30/04 (pALD).

Flints. As with 2004 and 2005, POA was again the principal site for recordings. Peak count for POA was 60 on 12/02 (GR) where birds were recorded on the mudflats during a WeBS count. Other high counts for POA were 25 birds on 18/01 (GR) and 21 birds on 15/01 and 8/10 (GR). The River Clwyd at Rhyl held 200+ on 26/01 (DCR). The largest counts elsewhere were 8 at CQNR on 3/03 (KS) and 12 at OMR on 8/12 (GR).

Whimbrel (Numenius phaeopus)

COEGYLFINIR

Passage migrant and localised summer visitor in small numbers. Amber List.

2004

Denbs. Inland: A single bird was recorded at Nant-y-Ffrith Reservoir on 30/04 (JLR). Coastal: CON held 12 on 28/04 (pALD).

Flints. Coastal: The peak count was 27 birds on 6/05 at OMR (JH). Other records of note were 11 at OMR 18/04 (JH), 10 at POA 18/04 (ANB), 10 at POA 31/07 (RH).

August records of birds at River Clwyd 2 (7/08 ANB), 4 (10/08 JR) and POA 2 (23/08 KS) show the principal autumn migration.

2005

Denbs. Coastal: The only record was on 25/09 of a single bird at Towyn (SM).

Flints. Inland: A single bird was recorded at Llanasa on 8/05 (ELJ). Coastal: The distribution of records for 2005 was relatively even along the coast. The primary site was POA where significant counts were 8 birds on 27/04 (RH) and 10 birds on 1/05 (pRS). The highest count was of 14 birds at Walwen Marsh, Bagillt on 8/05 (RH). The first record of the year was on 17/02 when a single bird was recorded at WF (pSD).

2006

Denbs. Coastal: The principal site for records this year was CON where the first record was of a single bird on 25/04 (pALD). The last record from CON was a single bird on 19/08 (pALD). Llanddulas had a single bird seen on 16/04 (RS) and TB had 6 birds on 4/08 (SM).

Flints. Coastal: The first record of the year was a single bird heard calling on 31/01 at Gronant (DR). An usual sighting was of 3 birds at SS on 23/04 (PT). The highest count of the year was 24 birds at OMR on 23/04 (GR). Rhuddlan had 1 bird on 20/02 (ANB).

Eurasian Curlew (Numenius arquata)

GYI FINIR

Breeding resident, passage migrant and winter visitor, Red List.


The Dee Estuary is an internationally important site for this species.

2004

Denbs. Inland: found in probable breeding area in small numbers mainly on RM. Single birds were seen at Gwynfryn on 13/05 and 1/06 (EM, NH). On Llandegla Moor, 3 male and 3 female birds were seen on 30/04 (JLR); 2 birds were at Llandegla on 17/05 and a single on 2/07 (TL). There were 2 birds at Penycae on 15/06 (JR) and a single 23/05 (NH). Away from RM, 2 birds were seen at Francis Lane, Wrexham on 29/05 and a single bird at Gresford Flash on 19/06 (both KS). Nant-y-Ffrith reservoir had 3 male and 3 female birds on 30/04 (JLR) and 2 birds on 29/03 and 9/04 (JLR, SD). At Mynydd Hiraethog4 birds were recorded on 12/04 (SM) and then 12+ birds on 18/06 (NH). Coastal: 250 birds were recorded at Kinmel Bay on 8/11 (RMB). There were also 50 birds at Belgrano beach on 22/01 (SM).

Flints. Inland: Bettisfield / Fenn's Moss had 9 birds on 20/04, 3 on 6/05 and 4 on 7/06 (all EHEM) with single birds seen between these dates. Single birds were seen at Cilcain 26/04 (HJ) and Babell 2/05 (ELJ). At Buckley, 3 birds were seen on 16/05 (GNR) and 2 birds at

Caerwys on 2/04 (AB). Coastal: large numbers of wintering and passage birds are found at coastal locations, with non-breeding birds found at these locations in the summer. Peak count for OMR was 116 on 4/12 (CM), with other large counts of 300+ birds recorded at Warren Farm POA during both winter periods.

2005

Denbs. Inland: probable breeding area at RM, first birds (6) seen at Pendinas Reservoir on 1/04 (JR) and subsequent sightings at various locations across RM, mainly of 1 or 2 birds. The first record of spring at Fenn's Moss was on 12/03 when a single bird was seen (EHEM). 23 birds were present on 12/05, this being the peak count for the area. Birds were recorded at Fenn's Moss from 1/04 to 2/07 (THu, JPA, EHEM, JD, PW, NH, BVO). 28 birds were recorded at Nant Lewis Alyn on 8/03 (ELJ), 2 birds were seen at Mynydd Hiraethog on 1/04 (SM) and 2 birds were recorded at Capel Siloam on 11/05 (MaO) and 19/06 (BV). Coastal: regular records were received from Towyn throughout the year, with occasional winter records from Llanddulas and Belgrano, the latter having a peak count of 80 birds on 29/01 (SM). The peak count was from CON on 15/07 when 330+ birds were seen. Llanddulas held 127 on 31/12 (EL).

Flints. Inland: only three records were received, of single birds, from Buckley on 17/04 (GNR), Cilcain on 5/05 (HJ) and Sandycroft on 12/06 (IMS). Coastal: large numbers of wintering birds found at locations all along the coast, with smaller numbers of non-breeding and passage birds found during the summer months. BB held 720 birds on 30/08 (RH) while 233 birds were at CQNR on 8/01 (CM) and 100+ at Rhyl.

2006

Denbs. Inland: records of possible breeding birds were again mainly from the RM area. The first bird of spring was recorded on 8/03 with 4 birds at Penycae (JLR) where 9 birds were also recorded on the 9/03 (JLR). Fenn's Moss held 5 birds on 10/05 (NH), 6 birds were seen at Penycae, including juvenile birds on 3/07 (JLR). Capel Siloam may have also been a breeding site with 3 bird seen on 30/04 (BVO) and 5 birds seen on 11/06 (MaO). Coastal: CON held the peak number of birds on 17/07 with 427 (pALD). Records from all along the coast, but peaks from Llanddulas with 78 birds on 9/02 (EL) and 2/03 (EL), Towyn with 80 birds on 28/12 (SM) and Colwyn Bay with 120 birds on 19/11 (DCR).

Flints. Inland: again birds were seen at Buckley - 2 birds on 16/04 (GNR). At Hendre, 2 birds were recorded on 24/05 (PD). At Fenn's Moss, 8 birds were seen on 19/06 (KS) with 15 on 22/06 (KS) and the last record of the season from there of 5+ birds on 2/07 (NH). Coastal. Large numbers of wintering birds found at locations all along the coast, with smaller numbers of non-breeding and passage birds found during the summer months. The maximum count at BB was 350 on 8/02 (GR), 200+ birds on the River Clwyd at Rhyl on 28/12 (HC, RC, AC) and OMR held 100 birds on 16/08 (GR).

Spotted Redshank (Tringa erythropus)

PIBYDD COESGOCH MANNOG

Passage migrant and scarce over-wintering visitor.

The Dee Estuary is of national importance for this species but with low figures from the Welsh side. All records were from coastal sites in Flints.

2004

Flints. There were seventy records in 2004, all from the Dee Estuary except a record of a single bird on the River Clwyd at Rhyl, seen on 29/06 (ANB). All other records of this species were from POA with thirty records and CQNR/OMR with thirty eight records. The peak count for the year was 10 birds at Oakenholt Marsh on 15/09 (DNS). Records were submitted for every month of the year apart from May and Jul. Almost all records from POA were of single birds but 2 birds were recorded on 26/02 (DR) and 1/12 (pSD). Both CQNR and OMR had counts of 2 or more birds more regularly than counts of single birds.

2005

Flints. Again, the principal site was CQNR/OMR. Records were received of single birds at Rhuddlan 26/08 (ANB) and Rhyl 20/09 (ANB). POA again had only records of single birds except 19/09 when 2 birds were recorded (CR). The peak for this year was 9 birds, recorded on Oakenholt Marsh 9/09 (WeBS). From Aug to Dec most of the records for CQNR are of 3 or more birds on the Bunded Pool area, whereas the records for OMR are of single birds (WeBS, DNS).

2006

Flints. A single record was received from the River Clwyd at Rhyl where a single bird was seen on 30/07 (DCR). Again, the principal area for this species is CQNR/OMR with 122

records. POA had 25 records of single birds, with 2 birds recorded on 26/08 (GR). The peak count was of 14 birds 16/10 (CL) on Oakenholt Marsh. High counts occurred with 8 (21/08, CL), 10 (19/10, CL), 12 (23/10, BH), 12 (30/10, CL), 8 (22/08, ANB), 9 (29/09, WeBS), 11 (20/09, CL), 12 (02/10, CL), 9 (23/10, GR).

Common Redshank (Tringa totanus)

PIBYDD COESGOCH

Possible breeding resident and common winter visitor. Amber List.

The Dee Estuary is of international importance for this species.

More records were received from Flintshire than Denbighshire presumably because of better habitat.

2004

Denbs. Inland: 3 birds were seen at Llyn Brenig on 18/07 (EL) and 8 birds were at BQW on 1/12 (LW). Coastal: 347 at River Clwyd on 13/03 (RH), 260 at Llanddulas Beach on 3/12 (EL) and 200 at Kinmel Bay on 8/03 RMB).

Flints. Inland: only record - a single bird was seen at FLQ on 3/05 (KS). Coastal: seen all along the coast in winter. Peak counts were from CQNR, 2,520 on 7/08, 1,353 on 2/09 and 1,134 22/08 (all DNS). OMR held 1,000 birds on 15/09, 17/09 and 1/10 (DNS). Peak count for POA was 800 birds on 12/01 (pRS).

2005

Denbs. Inland: birds were recorded at Llyn Brenig on 20/03 (KS) and at Wrexham with up to 9 birds at Boras Pool on the 7/01 and 9/01 (KS, SD). Gresford Flash held 10 birds on the 7/01 and 2 on 16/12 (HL, KS). Coastal: peak count was 240 birds at Llanddulas beach on 11/01 (EL). Counts of 200 were recorded at CON on 3/10 and Llanddulas

Flints. Coastal: again the Dee Estuary, particularly OMR and CQNR, were the principal sites for records. POA and BB also held good numbers in both winter periods. Peak counts from CQNR were 2,000+ on 25/03 (KS), 331 on 12/03 (pRS) and 341 on 24/07 (pRS). OMR had counts of 2,995 on 19/09, 1,611 on 9/09 and 1,504 on 25/08 (CM).

There were 700 birds at BB on 20/04 (RH) whilst POA had 1,000 birds on 16/10 (RH), 800 on the 5/11 (CW) and 780 on 7/10 (RH).

2006

Denbs. Inland: three records were received, two from the Conwy Valley with 3 birds on the Afon Conwy near Caerhun on 10/10 (SM) and a single bird at Tal-y-Cafn on 7/04 (JC). A single bird was also recorded at Gresford Flash on 27/03 (KS). Coastal: peak coastal counts for the year were from CON where 320 birds were recorded on 19/09, 280 on 2/09 and 272 on 26/08 (pALD) and Llanddulas beach where 100+ birds were recorded on 18/01 and 22/12 (EL).

Flints. Coastal: peak counts were at CQNR with 2,000+ birds recorded on 12/09 (CL), 28/08 (AW) and 9/10 (CM). OMR had peak counts of 1,000 birds on 22/08 (CL) and 24/08 and 11/09 (both GR).POA had 300 birds on 16/04 (RS). There were 200+ birds on the River Clwyd at Rhyl on 28/12 (CH, RC, AC).

Common Greenshank (Tringa nebularia)

PIBYDD COESWERDD

Passage migrant.

2004

Denbs. Coastal: the only record was of a single bird at CON on 12/03 and 13/05 (pALD).

Flints. Coastal: the primary area for records is along the Flintshire Coast/Dee Estuary with the bulk of the records from Oakenholt Marsh, CQNR and POA. There were records of a single bird at Rhuddlan on 19/08 (ANB) and SS on 21/10 (PT). Good numbers of birds were recorded at Rhyl with 7 birds on 10/08 and a single 11/08 (both ANB), 4 birds on 27/08 and 5/09 (JR) and 4 on 10/09 and 2 on 12/09 (both ANB). The peak count for the year was 20 at CQNR on 7/08 (DNS). This is a species that is regularly recorded in groups, with 4+ birds being fairly common group sizes.

2005

Birds were seen in every month of the year except May.

Denbs. Inland: a single bird was recorded at Fenn's Moss on 21/06 (EHEM).

Flints. Coastal: the majority of records were from CQNR, with additional counts from POA, Oakenholt Marsh and Rhyl. The highest count for the year was of 11 birds at CQNR on 25/08 and 9/09 (pRS and WEBS). POA had 2 to 3 birds seen on 19/09, 2/10, 5/10, 16/10 and 31/10 (SM, CR, KS, pSD).

2006

Denbs. Coastal: here were fifty eight records from CON mainly in the second half of the year, with a peak of 7 birds on 13/08 (pALD); 4 or more birds were seen on 11/08, 12/08, 13/08, 16/08, 26/08, 27/08, 1/09, 11/09, 12/09, 20/09, 21/09, 23/09, 24/09, 25/09 (all pALD).

Flints. Coastal: as with 2005, the majority of records are from the Dee Estuary with almost 66% of all records. The principal recording areas were: CQNR had a peak count of 29 on 20/09 (CL) with a small group being seen regularly from Aug (3 on 3/08 SS) until Oct (6 on 24/10 ET) on the Bunded Pools. Oakenholt Marsh held 23 birds on 24/08 (GR) with counts of 2 or more birds on 27/08, 15/01, 18/01, 11/09, 23/09, 10/11 (AW, GR). POA had a peak of 5 on 23/08 (GR) with singles in Jan, Aug, Sep, Nov, and Dec; 4 birds were here on 15/08 (AN).

Green Sandpiper (Tringa ochropus)

PIBYDD GWYRDD

Passage migrant and winter visitor in small numbers.

2004

Denbs. Inland: 2 birds were recorded at Three-Cornered Meadow in November (NFr). Coastal: 2 birds were recorded at CON on the 12/04 and 13/04 (pALD) and singles on 26/06 and 2/07 (pALD).

Flints. Coastal: the peak count was of 5 birds at Shotwick, Broken Bank in August (DOJ). Single birds were seen at SS in Jan, Apr, Jul and Nov. POA had a single bird on 5/08 and 6/08, singles were also seen at Rhuddlan on 11/08 and 19/08 (RMB, ANB), Connah's Quay (25/03), Oakenholt Marsh (19/07) and CQNR (26/07).

2005

Denbs. Inland: 2 birds were recorded at Three-Cornered Meadow 16/01 (NFr) and a single at Borras pool, Wrexham on 27/09 (KS).

Flints. Coastal: 2 birds were recorded at SS on 23/10 with singles on 20/03, 30/07 and 18/12 (all PT). Singles were also seen on the River Clwyd at Rhyl on 11/09 and 22/10 (CR) and at Rhuddlan on 11/09, 7/10 and 22/10 (SM, ELJ).

2006

Denbs. Inland: Marford (sightings on 5/03, 14/03, 19/03, 21/03, 24/03, 25/03, 27/03, 3/08, 9/08 JuR, JLR). Singles were also seen at Nant Lewis Alyn, Denbigh on 28/01 and Bod Petrual in Clocaenog Forest on 28/07. Coastal: CON had single birds on 1/06, 20/07, 23/07 and 30/7 with 3 birds also seen on 28/07 and 2 on the 23/07 (pALD).

Flints. Coastal: this species appears to favour a few sites in the area, namely SS (sightings on 19/02, 26/02, 19/03, 23/07, 27/08, 17/09, 15/10, 22/10, 29/10 all PT) There were also sightings from Rhuddlan, Shotwick, IMF and Oakenholt marsh.

Wood Sandpiper (Tringa glareola)

PIBYDD Y GRAEAN

Scarce passage migrant.
Only two records, both from Flints.

2005

Flints. One record of a single bird from River Clwyd at Rhyl in August (CRi).

2006

Flints. One record of a single bird at IMF on 4/05 (CW).

Common Sandpiper (Actitis hypoleucos)

PIBYDD Y DORLAN

Double passage migrant and breeding visitor.

No breeding recorded in the period of this report but birds probably breed on upland rivers and lakes such as Llyn Brenig and Llyn Alwen where they are regularly recorded in summer.

2004

Denbs. First bird seen at Kinmel Bay 31/03 (ANB). At Llyn Brenig, 2 were seen on 3/05 (KS) and 2 on the same day at Gresford Flash. Llyn Brenig held 4 birds on 15/05, the highest count of the year. Last birds were two at Minera Quarry on 6/07. Recorded from seven different sites.

Llyn Brenig had 2 birds on 5/05 (ELJ) as did Plas Uchaf Reservoir on 14/05. A single bird was on Llyn Aled Mynydd Hiraethog on 8/07 (SD). Last bird at Nant-y-ffrith Reservoir on 25/08 (SD). Recorded from 12 different sites.

Flints. First bird at SS on 24/04 (PT). Two birds seen at FLQ on 25/04 (KS), 2 at OMR on 25/04 and singles at POA on 29/04 (DR) and Gronant on 1/05 (KS). Autumn peak was 3 at POA Warren Farm on 29/09 (SD) and 2 at RSPB POA on 18/09 (RH). Last record of the year was 2 at Warren Farm on 29/09 (SD). Recorded from 14 different sites.

2006

Denbs. First bird of the year was seen on the 8/04 at CON (pALD) with 3 here on the 15/04. Gresford Flash held a single bird on the 21/04 (KS) with 2 on 23/04. There was a peak of 4 birds at Llyn Brenig on the 3/07 (CP). Breeding was proven at Dolwen reservoir where a pair were seen with 3 chicks on the 13/07 (ELJ) Last of the year were 4 birds seen at Tal-y Cafn on the 10/10 (SM).

Flints. First birds of the year were 2 seen at Rhyl on the 10/4 (SM) 4 birds were at Rhuddlan on the 15/04 (SH) with 3 at OMR on the 19/04 (AN). Peak in the spring was 5 birds at CQNR on the 30/04 (AW) .Up to 3 birds were seen at POA on the 16/07 (GR). Peak in autumn was 6 birds seen at Rhuddlan on the 22/08 (SM CR). Denbs. First bird seen off Splash Point Rhyl on 27/06 (DCR). One was seen chasing Sandwich Terns off Kinmel Bay on 9/09 (SM), 3 were offshore at Towyn on 2/09 (SM) and a single off Kinmel Bay on 9/09 was the last record for the year.

Flints. First bird off Gronant on 27/07 with the last bird seen off POA on 21/09 (KS). There was a peak of 17 birds at POA on 30/08 with 13 on 29/08 (ANB). Eight were there on 14/09 (NFr).

2005

Denbs. First bird offshore at Towyn on 18/09 (SM). Others were seen at Kinmel Bay on 26/09 and 2 off Towyn on 29/09 (SM)

Flints. First bird was off Gronant on 20/07. The last bird was at POA on 2/10 (both Dee Estuary Website). Relatively small numbers in 2005.

2006

Denbs. First bird of the year was seen offshore at Towyn on the 8/06(SM) ,with a second bird on the 13/06(SM) A dark phase bird was seen chasing Sandwich Terns over TB on the 2/08(SM). Three birds were seen over CON on the 23/08 (pALD). Both dark and pale phase birds were seen off Towyn on the 30/08 (SM), while 2 pale phase birds were seen off Pensarn beach on the 4/09 (SM). 2006

Denbs. The only bird was a single seen at CON on the 7/10 (pALD).

Sabine's Gull (Larus sabini)

In the late summer the peak count was 260 birds at the POA on 26/07 (GR) while 100+ birds were at POA on 10/08 (SM), 50 were at OMR on the 8/08. All birds had left the Shotton colony by the 3/09 when the last 2 birds were seen (PT). The last record for the year was 20 birds seen at POA on the 7/09 (GR).



This table, which will be a regular feature of the bird report in future, shows the recorded first and last dates for the majority of species regarded as migrants in north-east Wales. One notable exception is Blackcap which is omitted from this table because this species is now seen throughout the year, winter records coming mainly from gardens. First and last dates of genuine migrants then become impossible to distinguish from those of over-wintering birds.

Recorders are keen to note the first date when migrants are seen or heard each year but the last recorded dates show considerable variability. In 2005, the last Swift record was from July which may genuinely indicate an early departure but may equally show that recorders forgot to note later sightings. The last Swallow records in 2005 and 2006 were extremely late and conversely species such as Ring Ouzel, Wood Warbler and Pied Flycatcher were rarely seen after mid-summer. Recorders are encouraged to note down sighting dates for all these migrants so that future trends can be examined.

Action for Farmland Birds in Conwy

Britain's countryside has undergone major change since the Second World War. Agricultural policy change meant that farmers intensified their methods, achieving this by mechanisation, taking out field boundaries such as hedges, draining fields and filling in ponds to make the most of every possible piece of land. Such actions have resulted in Britain losing 95% of its wildflower meadows, 85% of its lowland heath and over half of the ponds since 1945. This intensification was compounded by advances in crop breeding and urbanisation. Not only had the habitats disappeared or been altered, but the seasonal cycle that our wildlife had become accustomed to had also changed. Many farmland bird species were unable to adapt to these changes and underwent population declines, many of which continue today. The species most affected are Lapwing, Black Grouse, Yellowhammer, Tree Sparrow, Linnet, Barn Owl and even species that are thought to be common, such as Bullfinch and Song Thrush. All of these species are recognised as needing conservation action in Conwy and are therefore included in the Conwy LBAP.

One project that is being carried out to help two bird species affected by these changes is the Hiraethog project. The Hiraethog moors are on the Conwy / Denbighshire border, in the south of Conwy County. It is an area of agriculture and forestry and has been a great area for wildlife in the past. Lapwing and Black Grouse were once common here and land with known records for these species is being targeted for appropriate land management to benefit these species. Such works include reed management and creating scrapes for Lapwing and heathland and forestry management for Black Grouse. The project has partners including RSPB, Forestry Commission, Countyside Council for Wales, North Wales Wildlife Trust, Welsh Development Agency, Welsh Water and Conwy and Denbighshire County Councils. Funding for the project has been made possible with assistance from the European Union's Objective 1 programme (through the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund provided through the Welsh Assembly Government) with additional support from Conwy and Denbighshire County Councils.

There are also two other major sites in Conwy where many efforts have been put into conservation action for Lapwing. The first is at the RSPB Conwy reserve, a site which was created from the spoil when the A55 was built, where Lapwing now successfully breed, with 13 pairs breeding in 2005. This site is also important as a place where local people can come and get to know this bird, which was once a familiar sight across Conwy. The other location where Lapwings are thriving in Conwy is at Morfa Madryn, near Llanfairfechan (owned by Conwy and Gwynedd County Councils). The reserve is managed by tenant farmers, who tailor their actions for the Lapwing. The site consists of low-lying marshy fields and has a series of pools and scrapes. The project has been a very successful one and in 2005 was the best breeding site for Lapwing in Wales, with 42 pairs present. Like the RSPB reserve this site also allows members of the public to enjoy their local birds.

The Barn Owl is another species mostly associated with farmland, a beautiful bird, which is known to have undergone population declines across much of the UK. However, the status of the Barn Owl population in Conwy is relatively unknown. In order to address this issue the North-East Wales Barn Owl project was launched. The project has resulted in over 50 landowners being contacted and over 30 farmers requesting to have Barn Owl nest boxes erected in their barns. Boxes have already gone up in 8 Conwy farms, but there are still many boxes for us to put up over the winters of 2006 and 2007.

We are lucky enough in Conwy to have received funding from the European Union Objective 1 funds (provided through the Welsh Assembly Government) and the Countryside Council for Wales to put towards conserving and enhancing the biodiversity of Conwy's countryside. Since the autumn of 2004 we have been able to carry out biodiversity projects on land throughout Conwy. One project we have just started is one specifically designed to help conserve smaller farmland birds, such as Tree Sparrow and Yellowhammer. This project includes improving bird habitat on farms that carry out pheasant shoots and hence already have some cover crops present. By making some fairly basic adjustments, such as protecting scrub habitat and hedgerows for roost and nest sites and providing the farmers with additional seed mixes to mix with their kale to provide a more favourable food supply for smaller birds, we hope we can greatly help to increase the local populations of these species.

In summary, the aim of these projects is that one day the local community of Conwy will not be so amazed to see species such as the Lapwing at nature reserves like Morfa Madryn or RSPB Conwy because they and other farmland birds will be a familiar sight throughout Conwy's countryside once again.

Y Graig Nature Reserve

Y Graig (The Rock) is a nature reserve on a small limestone escarpment near the village of Tremeirchion. It has been managed by the North Wales Wildlife Trust since 1987 to protect the calcareous grassland, woodland, scrub and bare rock habitats it supports. The reserve is 8.6 ha in size and is divided between three owners: the NWWT (4.8 ha); Denbighshire County Council (2.4 ha); and the Tremeirchion Consolidated Relief in Need Charity (1.5 ha).

Approximately half the reserve is Oak woodland with a well developed understorey of Hazel, Hawthorn, Holly, Cherry and Rose. Ash, Elm, Sycamore and Silver birch are scattered throughout the woodland as well as the occasional mature Beech, which are a noticeable feature of the site. The woodland floor supports a range of native plants, noticeably Bluebell and Common Dog Violet in spring, and Herb Robert, which seems able to produce flowers almost throughout the year.

The reserve offers magnificent views of the Vale of Clwyd from its upper slopes and rounded top, which support limestone grassland with areas of bracken. Sheep's Fescue is the dominant grass, within which a variety of plants grow such as Common Rock-rose, Salad Burnet, Ploughman's Spikenard, Bird's-foot Trefoil, Common Stalk's-bill, and Carline Thistle. Small patches of acid soil within the grassland allow Bell Heather, Heath Bedstraw and Tormentil to grow. A disused quarry exists at the southern end of the reserve, within which notable flowers such as Autumn Ladies Tresses, Pyramidal Orchid and Autumn Gentian may be found. The grassland habitats are kept in good condition by a small herd of hardy Hebridean sheep, a primitive breed able to take care of themselves, and bracken and scrub are cleared by hand every year to keep it under control.

Many bird species frequent the reserve including Great Tit, Marsh Tit, Treecreeper, Nuthatch, Green and Great Spotted Woodpecker, Jay and Pied Flycatcher. Woodcock often overwinter within the woodland areas, which are regularly patrolled by Tawny Owls. The areas of Gorse,

Blackthorn and Hawthorn scrub provide good breeding habitat for Yellowhammer, Mistle Thrush, Bullfinch, Whitethroat, Blackcap, Long-tailed Tit and Greenfinch. Buzzards can often be seen in the skies around the reserve, taking advantage of thermals rising from the ground.

Wild mammals are less visible, but Polecats, Wood Mice and Bank Voles have been seen, and most recently, hazelnuts gnawed by Dormice have been found within the reserve, which provides very good proof that they are present.

Y Graig is also a great place for invertebrates and 25 butterfly species have been recorded including Holly Blue, Comma, Purple Hairstreak, Orange Tip, Dingy Skipper, Small Pearl-bordered Fritillary, Grayling, Brown Argus and Green Hairstreak. In June and July, the pale greenish light from female Glow Worms attracting a mate can be seen on the south and west facing grassland areas. Ant hills made by the Yellow Meadow Ant are also visible in the grass, and this indicates that the site has not been ploughed, probably due to its shallow soils.

A number of paths through the reserve enable good access for the reasonably fit, and circular walks are possible. Picnic tables have also been carefully placed to provide great places to have a packed lunch while enjoying the wonderful views!

Y Graig is situated half a mile south of Tremeirchion, to the east of St. Asaph at SJ 086 721. From the A55 turn south on to the B5429 for 2 miles. From the A541, turn North at Bodfari for 2 miles. Park at the side of the road opposite Tremeirchion Chapel. A reserve leaflet is available from the NWWT on 01248 351541 and costs 25p. Members of the NWWT get a booklet about the reserves for free, so why not call and join us!

Wildlife Crime in North-East Wales

I have been asked to submit an article reflecting on some of the wildlife crime work of North Wales Police in North-East Wales. During the past five years hundreds of files have crossed my desk and we have been able to resolve many of these cases without recourse to the courts. Unfortunately probably even more files remain unresolved. Establishing guilt beyond all reasonable doubt as required by criminal courts is a hard call for any criminal offence but where the injured party cannot communicate with you life becomes even more difficult. Dr Doolittle would have been a wonderful resource for any wildlife crime officer.

Taking up post I was perhaps very naive in thinking that I would be spending the majority of my time dealing with the high profile wildlife crime of egg theft with perhaps a bit of poisoning thrown in. I was immediately disabused of this on my very first shift as the first case brought to my attention related to the destruction of Great Crested Newt resting places. Eventually that case went to court with the developers being found guilty; unfortunately this was a detection rate that could not be sustained.

Although perhaps not the greatest part of our work, Divisional Wildlife Crime Officers and I have spent a lot of time investigating wildlife crime relating to birds and I would like to reflect on some of our work in North-East Wales. This area has never been an area visited routinely by Operation Easter targeted egg collectors. These are a group of people identified by the Police as active egg collectors who travel throughout the United Kingdom taking the eggs of

some of our most vulnerable species. Indeed on reflection I can only recall one incident of the eggs of Schedule 1 birds having been stolen within North-East Wales and that on the very western fringes of Conwy. There is however intelligence to suggest that some of the Operational targets visit the area on a regular basis.

The Spring of 2006 saw a very interesting case involving the disturbance of a Goshawk in the Clocaenog forest. The offender in this case was not interested in taking eggs but was instead a rogue photographer who wished to photograph the birds on the nest. It must be said however that there were clear links to the egg collecting community. The consequence of his activities was that the nest was abandoned.

The most pleasing aspect of this case for me was not actually gaining the conviction but the way in which so many people gave so freely of their time and expertise. In my view the case was a great example of partnership working with so many people and organisations making such valuable contributions. It is perhaps wrong to single out particular individuals but Pete Burton made such a valuable contribution it would be remiss not to mention him by name.

The fine imposed on the individual may not have been huge at £400 but he had his equipment of equal value confiscated and was banned from entering any nature reserve for 12 months. This was the first such penalty ever imposed in the UK.

Operation Easter and the introduction of custodial sentencing led a couple of years ago to the Police being informed that the level of egg collecting had reduced to such an extent that it was probably no longer the criminal activity that posed the greatest threat to schedule 1 birds and raptors in particular. Instead it was suggested that our efforts should be directed at illegal poisoning. This is where most of our time is now spent.

The poisoning of Peregrine Falcons is sadly an activity that is encountered most years. Annually we find or hear of pigeons smothered in poison having been staked out near eyries where they have been taken by Peregrines. In one particular incident we were fortunate to receive reports of young Peregrines suffering from the effects of poisoning at an early stage. Working with the RSPCA on that occasion the chicks were recovered from the quarry they resided in and taken for veterinary treatment where they recovered and were subsequently returned to the territory a few days later.

Whilst the recovery and eventual return of Peregrines might be considered to be a success the fact was that we (the Police) did not have any evidence that could be used to form a prosecution against those responsible. Realistically obtaining enough evidence to institute proceedings in relation to the poisoning of peregrine falcons is unlikely to happen. If we sit back and wait for evidence to be presented to us it is unlikely that any positive action would be taken and we have, therefore, tried to use other means. Such an alternative is likely to take the form of intelligence obtained from sources with knowledge of who is poisoning Peregrine Falcons and the methods being used.

By gathering intelligence proactive action has been taken against those suspected of poisoning Peregrine Falcons in Conwy and Denbighshire. On one occasion search warrants were executed on a number of premises resulting in searches of pigeon lofts and private houses. More recently we have asked and accompanied Inspectors of the Welsh Assembly Government to search private dwellings and associated buildings. Such searches are of course unlikely to turn up evidence of a specific offence where birds have been poisoned but are directed more at finding evidence relating either to the possession of illegal pesticides

such as alphachloralose or of illegal use and storage of chemicals that can be lawfully possessed.

None of the searches outlined were successful on the day but there is no doubt that those targeted as well as others in their social circle received a very strong message to the effect that we take the issue seriously. It might perhaps be rather too early to be congratulating ourselves but the fact is that since those searches were conducted there have been no incidents of Peregrine persecution in an area that had previously been identified as a poisoning hotspot.

The poisoning of Peregrine Falcons is not the only form of poisoning that takes place in North Wales. Gamekeepers are often deemed to be persecutors of anything with talon or claw. In reality in North Wales we have had very few poisoned birds being recovered in situations suggesting persecution by game interests. However two years ago North Wales Police received intelligence to the effect that raptors were being routinely persecuted on a Flintshire estate. The suggestion was that an under-keeper was poisoning the birds without the knowledge of his head keeper.

On the basis of the intelligence received magistrates were prepared to issue search warrants which were executed in an operation involving not only North Wales Police but also Welsh Assembly Government Inspectors and investigators from the RSPB's investigation unit. The search took place over a number of hours and included not only a dwelling but also numerous outbuildings and the grounds of the estate, in particular the areas around the pheasant release pens. No evidence of raptor persecution was found but two large tins of Cymag were found in an outbuilding. Cymag is a chemical that was in common use as a pesticide but its use was banned some years ago with possession having been made illegal more recently. Other pesticides were found stored in a manner that did not conform to legal requirements.

It is clear that on many occasions where gamekeepers persecute birds of prey they do so because of pressure exerted on them by their employers or those for whom they provide shooting. Those pressures can become enormous where tied accommodation and family considerations are taken into account.

In the past where gamekeepers have been convicted they shoulder the blame with their employees not being required to evidence that they had taken measures to prevent illegal acts taking place. In more recent times legislation has been passed that requires employers to ensure that they carry out proper health and safety assessments relating to the storage and use of hazardous materials including pesticides. As a consequence where the Police are investigating potential offences the focus of the enquiry will be on the employers as much as the employees.

In the case outlined the head keeper was eventually formally cautioned for offences relating to the offences identified. His employers, a family of standing in the community, were able to demonstrate that in this particular case that they had no legal responsibility for the proper storage of pesticides. However the fact that they were the focus of a criminal investigation again sent a clear message that where offences relating to pesticides are being investigated employers as well as employees are equally liable.

There are many other issues involving birds that North Wales Police Wildlife Crime Officers have investigated in North-East Wales. Illegal trading of song and shore birds taken from the wild, the intentional killing of a Mute Swan by the rider of a water bike, the intentional killing of

a Sparrowhawk by a young driver, and the illegal setting of pole traps have all resulted in prosecutions. Operation Artemis, a national Policing Operation aimed at tackling Hen Harrier persecution, has been implemented whilst the illegal trading of taxidermy specimens on internet auction sites has been identified as an emerging problem. We therefore have plenty to do but we cannot do it without the assistance of the public who can help so much. North Wales Breeding Bird Atlas 2008-2011 Your help is needed!

The next few years will be very exciting for birdwatchers in north Wales (Conwy, Denbighshire, Flintshire, Gwynedd including Ynys Môn across to Wrexham) because we are undertaking a major bird atlas project that everyone can take part in. Many other parts of the UK have done local bird atlases since the 1960s but this has never been done in north Wales. Maybe the size of the task has been too daunting and no-one has been brave enough to take on the project but a small group of keen but slightly mad birdwatchers decided that the time was right. The British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) was organising its national repeat of the Wintering and Breeding Atlases for the UK and if we were to do an atlas project in north Wales then it had to be now. This group of people comprises Andrew Dale, Geoff Gibbs (Caerarfonshire), Kelvin Jones (Meirionydd), Peter Stuttard (Ynys Môn) and myself.

A local atlas can provide invaluable baseline information that helps to determine conservation priorities and action. Not surprisingly, the project has received support from all the major statutory and voluntary conservation organisations, local authorities etc across the area. This support is essential in promoting the project but the main task will be to find sufficient volunteers to adequately cover what is a huge geographic area including some quite remote and not readily accessible terrain.

The basic survey unit for the atlas is a tetrad (2x2 km square). There are 25 tetrads in each 10km square and in north Wales this amounts to just less than 1600 tetrads. We are only aware of a couple of hundred regular birdwatchers/recorders/surveyors across the whole of north Wales so covering all these tetrads is going to be a tall order. This project will rely on the input of those dedicated few but offers the great opportunity to bring on board new volunteers and introduce them to the delights of atlassing, which I can assure you is great fun. Although we are asking surveyors to spend only 2-4 hours in each and every tetrad in the breeding season, some tetrads will require at least this much travelling time just to get there.

We sowed the seeds for this project with birders and local clubs in 2005 and started having regular planning meetings in 2006. A website will be going live in late 2007 (www.northwalesbirdatlas.co.uk) . This will provide a lot more detailed and up-to-date information. This project has been given a lovely Lapwing logo by our celebrated local artist Thelma Sykes.

What will the atlas tell us? We have heard a lot about species declines over the past few years and sadly for many of our specialised woodland and farmland species such as Lesser Spotted Woodpecker and Yellowhammer, these declines may well have continued. There are, however,

some winners as well as losers and Little Egret is likely to be one of these. The atlas will be comprehensive and there may be some pleasant surprises as gaps in distribution are filled in places where birdwatchers rarely frequent.

How can you take part? We hope that all readers of this report can contribute in some way. Whatever your birdwatching skills there is something you can do. The regular birdwatcher can adopt a tetrad and find as many of the breeding species within that tetrad as your time will allow. Surveyors will need to visit all the major habitats in the tetrad and where possible make an evening visit to sites you think may have nightime species such as owls, woodcock etc. Two to four hours should be the minimum time allocated to each tetrad but experience from pilot surveys, elsewhere in the UK, indicates that few extra species are found after ten hours effort and that volunteer time is then best used by moving on to another tetrad. Given our restricted volunteer workforce this is what we would advise. All birdwatchers can provide Roving Records (casual reports) for records of birds seen in the breeding season from right across the atlas area, from garden records to one-off birding trips. It is vital, however, that recorders note down the tetrad where birds are seen. All recording forms and guidance on how to identify tetrads are available from the Atlas Coordinators.

An update on progress will be provided in future North-east Wales Bird Reports, in regular volunteers newsletters and of course on the website. Your help is vital so please get in touch.

Ringing Report 2004 – 2006

The numbers of birds ringed show increases for all three years over the total for 2003 (6958). There have been some changes in the ringing effort as circumstances change and the weather takes its toll by preventing mist-netting. It is also noticeable that the contribution of the late Andy Madden ended in 2005, though another MRG ringer, Nicky Edwards, has taken over the site and is still contributing records. Also, it is evident that there has been more effort put into the ringing of nestlings – with increases of 20%-25% over the 2003 totals for pulli ringed. For my part, this has also meant that the BTO has been supplied with electronic versions of nest record cards with the 'full' histories of the nestlings ringed. I understand that the members of MRG are increasingly using the program IPMR to record nest histories. This increase is of great use to the BTO as nest histories that are submitted electronically are available to be used in national analyses almost immediately (after some checking processes are completed). The key contributors to the ringing totals have been Merseyside Ringing Group (Bob Harris, Paul Triggs and Pete Coffey), John Lawton Roberts, the Spence and Brenchley partnership (lan M Spence), Stuart K Thomas and Bernard Wright. I am very grateful to all who have made this report possible.

Fairly good numbers of raptors have been ringed, though effort has varied. The Common Tern rafts at Shotton have done very well, with a record year in 2006. It can be seen that 2006, conversely, was not a good year for owls. Both Barn Owl and Tawny Owl fared badly because it was a very poor vole year – probably partly related to the cyclical nature of vole populations but not helped by poor, cool, wet weather in May which would not have assisted their breeding. Fewer voles meant that I did not find any evidence of Tawny Owls breeding and I only found two active nests of Barn Owl. Kestrels suffered too, and from the remains visible in their nests they turned to birds as prey with the lack of voles to feed their young.

The numbers of Grasshopper Warbler ringed has declined, partly because I was not able to make as many ringing visits to Bronbannog, but also probably because the habitat at the site is changing – willow and birch trees are growing where there used to be just herb level vegetation. Consequently, the habitat these warblers need has reduced to a great extent.

It is clear that the members of MRG and myself are checking many nest-boxes – see the totals for Pied Flycatcher, Blue Tit and Great Tit. Worryingly, the totals for Pied Flycatcher have been lower for all three years reported here than in 2003 and there is concern for the conservation status of this species. It appears to be declining at all sites – especially by occupying fewer boxes than in previous years. As yet, nobody knows what is happening and whether it is a local issue or one that relates to its migrations or wintering area in Africa. However, if there is concern about Pied Flycatcher, inspection of the totals list shows that Spotted Flycatchers are much harder to find as they seem to be distributed at very low density in our area.

Many Blue and Great Tits have been ringed, but they are ringed while they are still growing in their nests, usually at least a week before fledging. The tables of breeding success for these species in the systematic list show that actual productivity can vary considerably from year to year, with 2005 being an especially poor year for Blue and Great Tits.

There have been more House Sparrows ringed, at least partly because of their success in nest-boxes at a site near Bodelwyddan. I have been able to ring birds at three Tree Sparrow colonies for these three years, so their totals have increased. One of the colonies was still new in 2004 but is growing each year. The Chaffinch totals are impressive and increased on the 2003 totals and clearly 2004 was a good year for Siskin.

The Common Terns continue to provide interesting recoveries, with many spending at least some of the winter off the coast of west Africa. So, why did one go as far as Namibia, nearly twice the distance of the other African recoveries – or do they all go that far south, but because of a lower human population in Namibia the birds are not so readily recovered?

Unfortunately the Cetti's Warbler controlled by MRG in 2003 was not trapped in the period covered by this report and no other has turned up as yet. It appears that Reed Warblers from north-east Wales do not all migrate via Icklesham, as some use a more directly southerly route to western France and beyond. Presumably the Willow Warbler caught at Shotton in spring was still on its way north to Scotland.

The other recoveries that I have included are mainly movements over 40 km that are of interest. Two recoveries of Siskin ringed at the same site in Nottinghamshire do suggest that perhaps there are cross-country flights by birds on a regular basis.

Ringers enjoy their ringing and contribute to the analyses conducted by BTO staff that show changes in survival rates. These changes can affect bird populations and their conservation status. Ringers do retrap birds ringed by other ringers, but the majority of ringed birds are found dead, often by members of the public. If you find a dead bird with a ring on it, please ensure that the BTO receives the information. This can be done by writing a letter if you are so inclined, or the information can be submitted via a website, www.ring.ac.uk for those who prefer more modern communication methods. However you send in the information you will, eventually, receive a sheet of paper showing where and when the bird was ringed, the distance moved and how long it lived.

Wales Raptor Study Group – North-East Wales

The Wales Raptor Study Group – North-East Wales is a small number of fieldworkers who are dedicated to protecting raptors, owls, Chough and Raven. Currently, in the Vice Counties of Denbighshire and Flintshire there are about ten people who contribute records to the Group. We are not able to record the nests of all the species we are interested in every year but most of the nests of Schedule 1 species are checked. Most of the fieldworkers are volunteers and do fieldwork in their spare time.

One of the key problems for the species we record is that of disturbance. Several of the species we check are protected by Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act, 1981, so their nests cannot be wilfully disturbed without a licence to do so. All of the fieldworkers in our Group have the appropriate licence each year from the Countryside Council for Wales, with which we have a close working relationship. Each fieldworker covers an area and this ensures that only one or two people visit each nest, but those visits are co-ordinated to prevent undue disturbance. We also have good working relations with the local Police Wildlife Liaison Officers.

Each year a report shows how each nest has fared, but each nest is only referred to by its code – we never discuss openly where the nests are located.


